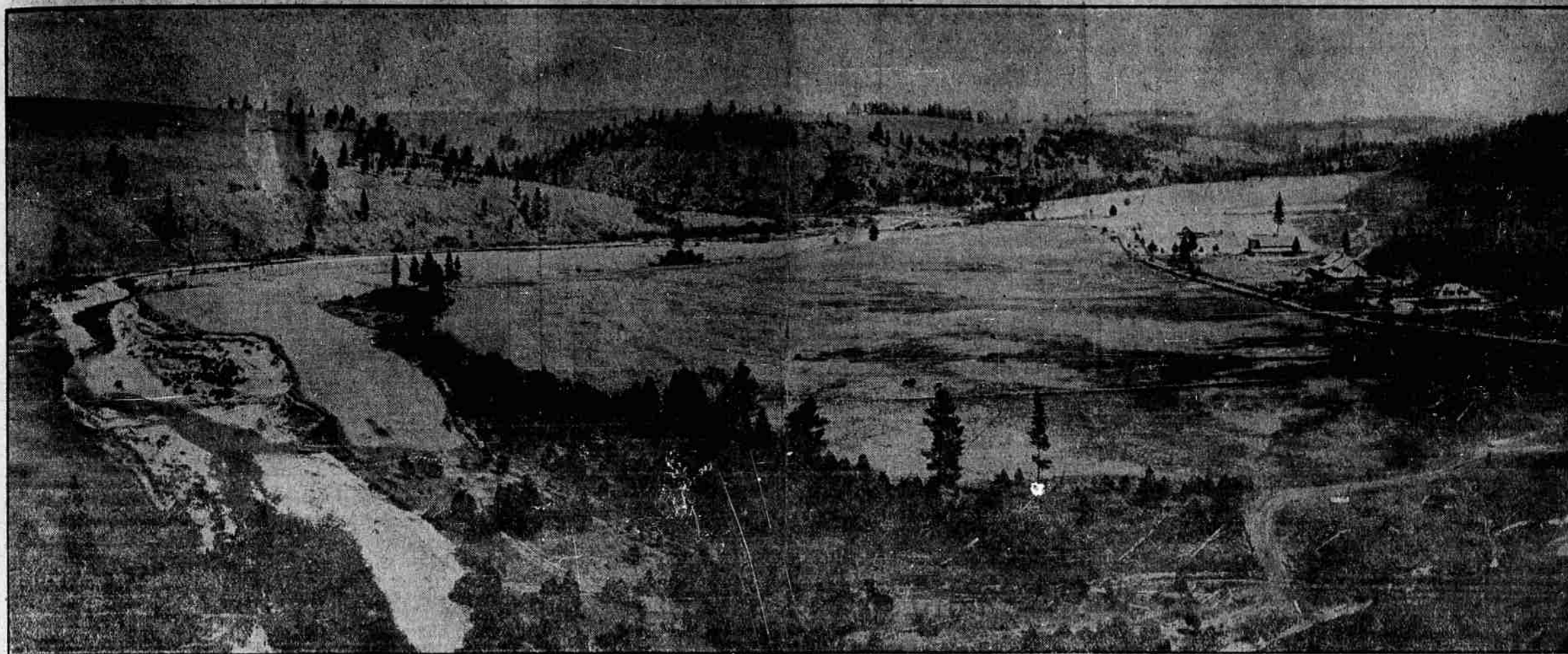


Commonwealth Ranch On Market

LONG STRUGGLE WITH CANCER PROVES FATAL.

Former La Grande Lady Dies at Trent, Ore.—Relatives Here.

Mrs. Mary King, wife of Geo. D. King, died near Trent, Ore., May 7, 1913.
