

BEEF PRICES SOARING HIGH

RECORD PRICE IS SET FOR BEEF YESTERDAY.

Nine Dollars Paid and Shipments are Heavy—Strong Tones Too.

Portland, May 13.—(Special)—The cattle market at North Portland

was extremely excited yesterday. One sale was made during the morning at \$9, an advance of 50c above any previous quotation ever reached in the local market at any time, and that amount higher than last week's extreme advance.

The big advance was made in record prices for cattle at North Portland yesterday in the face of one of the greatest runs that ever entered the local yards.

There were shipments of cattle from four states during the day, Oregon, Idaho, California and Montana being included in the offerings. Thirteen loads came from Montana alone.

There was a firmer tone generally in the cattle trade all over the country for the day. Notwithstanding this the local market jumped above the price at all centers with the exception of Chicago. Both South Omaha and Kansas City were distanced in price today for the first time this season.

Out look in the cattle market is for continued extreme strength.
