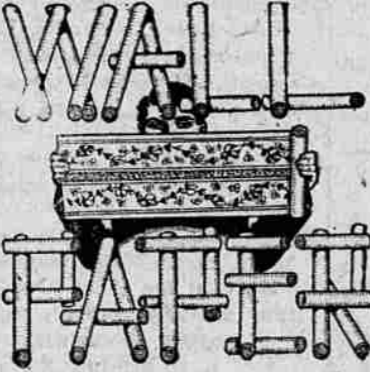

Bitter Fight On.

Harrisburg, Pa. May 14.—A bitter fight against the proposed law to regulate the conditions and hours of labor of women and children in Pennsylvania by manufacturers and their representatives opened here this afternoon when the hearings on this bill and the bill to establish a minimum wage commission opened at the state house. Friends and foes of the proposed law were here today in great numbers, as these hearings are admitted by both sides to be the crucial test put to the legislature to show whether that body will place itself on record as "progressive" along these lines. The hearing was scheduled before the special judiciary committee of the senate. The women and child labor bills were drafted by the legislative committee of the Republican state convention, and it was believed by many that they will be favorably acted on. Members of the Progressive party and certain avowedly progressive Democrats are strongly in favor of the establishment of the proposed minimum wage commission. The majority of the legislature, however, are thought to be opposed to it.

Among those who advocated the passage of all three measures today were Henry G. Wasson, of Pittsburg, chairman of the Republican State convention; William Draper Lewis, dean of the University of Pennsylvania Law school; Charles Chute, of Philadelphia, secretary of the Pennsylvania Child Labor association; and representatives of similar organizations in New York, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Will Go to Sweden.

Paris, May 14.—Jean Bouin, champion French runner, announced today at an athletic meeting called to arouse enthusiasm for the next Olympic games that he will attempt a world's record for the hour run sometime next month. He will probably go to Sweden to turn the trick, as that tract is thought to be the fastest in the world.
