

COUNCIL TALKS CEMENT CURBS

PLENTY OF SCHOOLING ON
ON SUBJECT GIVEN.

Stoner to be Paid in Full and Plumbing Inspector Status Quo.

Much discussion and comparatively little business resulted from the special meeting of the council last night. Cement curbing in all its details were discussed and a school of instruction given from men who understand cement work and from some who don't. Whether or no curbing should be faced was one subject that was given plenty of attention with little or no actual conclusions drawn. The Warren people said they wanted to make good defective curbing that had been put in without facing last year just as the city engineer ordered it.

The water superintendent-plumbing inspector's job took up another half hour of time and resulted in orders to the water committee to draft an ordinance amending the present water ordinance, which shall properly combine the two offices. L. M. Hoyt has not acted as plumbing inspector since the seventh of May because the finance committee held up his pay and during that time there has been no inspector. The upshot will probably be that he will be appointed inspector under a new ordinance and

given the \$15 plumbing salary. R. S. Clapp petitioned for a license to conduct a candy wagon. It was referred.

Harry Stoner will be paid in full for his services as street superintendent, a portion of which salary was held up by the finance committee and later the council.

Mrs. S. Z. Zuber appeared before the council and in detail explained

how she had, in her opinion, been overcharged for water used.

The old fire alarm tower and bell are to be torn down and removed, and the ways and means committee was instructed to move the tool house off Fourth and Penn., so the new library can be built there.

Petitioners asked for an extension of water mains on M West from First street into the new territory being developed with new homes.
