WALLA WALLA BERRIES LATE

MAY BE JUNE FIRST BEFORE THEY RIPEN.

Walla Wallans Anticipate no Berry Shipments in May.

There will be no Walla Walla strawberries during May. This is the advice given to local merchants from Walla Walla where just such weather as prevails in Union county is holding back berries. June 1st is the estimate that Walla Walla growers place on the date of ripe berries, though a special warm spell there might bring them out a little earlier.

The California variety remains about the same as to quantity but has increased in richness of flavor slightly. Twenty cents is still the price per box for the Southern kind.
