FITCHNER'S SPEED MIGHTY

ONE CLEAN HIT GARNERED OFF HIS OFFERINGS.

Spuds Take Third Game From Yakima by Masterly Pitching.

Bert Fitchner was a bear yesterday and after one inning in which a complication of things permitted Yakima to score her two and only tallies, the speed merchant went like a house afire to the finish, pitching a game that but for strange dabbling of rules and fortune would have been a one-hit game. One clean single was found, and two hits of the scratchiest sort imaginable was his record. But if the aforesaid second inning the Spuds behind the bullet-ejector were tight as a whistle and gave to the fans some classiest baseball. The Spuds won and deserved to win for Kane's puzzlers were finally solved, and with seven beautiful innings to his credit Kane weakened eighth and permitted the Spuds to grow lopsided. It was an uphill pull that the Spuds had for the Braves had the game sewed up two to one at the end of the fifth.

While luck broke against Fitchner in spoiling a one-hit game, it—luck—also saved his bacon from more scores. With the bases full Fitchner had two out and two strikes and three balls on Jansen. The little fellow saw a wild one coming and before it reached the pan, turned to throw his bat to the bench and trot off to the initial bag on a walk. The act cost him an out. The ball, way wild, hit the bat and bounded back to Walters for the third out. It was a rare stunt indeed.

There is no particular complaint to make at the Braves' behavior. One must give Kane credit for some beautiful work on the mound and Stevens catching is no less to be commended. Reid had some hard luck in the outfield, but otherwise the Yakimans played tight ball, but were outbatted at the finish and at no time, nowhere, nohow, could they win the way that Fitchner with all its periodical wildness was going and his backing behaving.

The Braves started the scoring in the second after Reid had gone down Corbin to Walters. Grover hit a slow grounder toward short that Corbin came up to field, and after glomming it safely, struck a greasy spot with his foot and fell to a sitting posture. Though he threw from there it was both too late and too wide. If Corbin's performance could be called an error, then Fitchner pitched a two-hit game. Later, Stokke's hit to Corbin was thrown slightly wide, but while in the act of tagging the runner on the baseline, Walters dropped the ball. On the next play Miller hit to Lee who mused it up and after Grover was about home threw to Peterson and Peterson threw to King to catch Stokke and it was wide and King dropped it. Fitchner pushed Stokke across by walking Ford.

There Yakima's scoring stopped for Fitchner settled down to beautiful ball pitching and his support behind him was amply sufficient.

In the third canticle Walters walked, stole second and came home when Beck singled. There was no fuss around the gong until the sixth when

La Grande tied it up and went one better. Beck doubled, Reid dropped Druhot's long fly, Nadeau sacrificed, flied Druhot in and Jamison singled scoring Beck. In the eighth inning, Nadeau singled, King sacrificed him to second, Jamison got his third hit in three times up, Peterson walked, Walters doubled through Miller's legs and went out trying to stretch it to three bags.
