CLASS HEARS GOOD ADVICE

GRADUATES TOLD OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITY

Baccalaureate Sermon Replete With Kernels of Good Thought.

Individual responsibility to God by each member of the '13 graduating class of the high school, was emphasized yesterday morning by A. G. Lane of the Presbyterian church in an baccalaureate sermon to the class. The church was well filled with friends of the church and school, and the well-worded sermon was supplemented with excellent music.

Mr. Lane used as the text of his baccalaureate sermon, Rom. 14:12: "So then everyone of us shall give account of himself to God," announcing as his theme, the idea of personal responsibility.

He emphasized the fact of responsibility, calling attention to certain forces in operation in all the ages past whose tendency has been to weaken and obscure the sense of individual responsibility, such as a skeptical philosophy of materialistic trend, which fails to recognize the active presence of God in and over His universe, and which conceives of creation as subject only to impersonal law. Also the tendency of the times to centralization of power in the form of gigantic organizations, trusts, syndicates and the like, which unless carefully safeguarded weaken responsibility by encouraging the individual to hide behind the institution. The universal prevalence of sin, also tends to weaken responsibility. He urged young people to look this fact of responsibility squarely in the face, since none can escape it, and thus to take the first step in the direction of a successful life.

The personal feature of responsibility was largely emphasized, and the young people were reminded that the recognition of personal responsibility begins at the cross, in the but never at the right time, although Harrod did catch him for a homer in the fifth but the game was already gone. Dr. Lane closed his sermon with the following special counsel to the graduating class which the class arose to hear:

"And now young ladies and gentlemen of the graduating class, a parting word:

"You are about to go forth from the school room and from under the eye of your instructors, either to enter upon the practical duties of life or else perhaps to prosecute your studies in wider fields of investigation. Be diligent, be humble, be charitable toward all men. Whatever befalls you never lose faith in God, and never lose sight of the fact of your personal responsibility. Embalm in your hearts as a priceless treasure the memory of these instructors who, through patience of faith and long suffering love have brought you this far along your way. Their counsels, their helps, and their reproofs as well, will mean more to you by and by, than they can possibly mean now.

"You will discover some day that they have been the best friends of your life. And perhaps, when the years shall have fled, and they sleep under the sod, you will want to return and reverently lay a flower on their graves, as a token of your love and a sweet reminder of 'the days of Auld Lang Syne.' Be true to God, be true to the past, be true to yourselves, and all shall be well. Accept for yourselves the wise words of advice given by Polonius to Laertes in 'Hamlet':

"This above all—to thine
Own self be true;
And it must follow as the
Night the day,
Thou canst not then
Be false to any man."
