BERRIES IN GOOD DEMAND

PORTLAND GOBBLES UP ALL SHIPMENTS.

Portland Dealers Complain Against California Packers.

Portland, May 19.—(Special)—Market for strawberries is holding rather firm with values practically the same as at the closing of the week. Most of the big shipments that arrived from California late Saturday were cleaned up before the opening of business today, only one lot of rather poor quality being held over. Sales were made from \$1.50 to \$1.65 for Dollars of best quality while Jessies sold from 25c to 35c below these figures.

Local berries are arriving in very limited supply, although offerings show a slight increase from day to day. Advances from the earlier sections again tell of big loads of berries on the plants and it is expected that with a few days of sunshine home offerings will be greatly increased.

Much complaint is heard of the pack of the California fruit. While the top layers are of excellent quality it has been found that most of the offerings under the first tier are either green or are of inferior quality. Most of these are packed by Japanese growers in the south and local producers claim that it is unfair competition.

There is talk of securing the passage of a law which will make the top of the pack represent the entire package. If this is done it will enable consumers and buyers to know exactly what they are getting without dumping out the entire package.
