

HORSES AND CLOWNS SELLS-FLOTO CHIEF FEATURES UNION PLANS

FINE TIME

40 HORSES AND 75 BOOSTERS TO TAKE SPECIAL TO BAKER

Stops at Haines, North Powder, Telocaset and Baker.

Union, Ore., May 22.—(Special)—Arrangements were completed today when Mr. Miller and Mr. Clark of the O.-W. R. & N. were here on a visit, for the stock show "special" to Baker next Saturday. It is expected that about 40 horses and 75 boosters will make the trip in the interest of the Union Live Stock show, now only two weeks off. Stops will be made at North Powder, Haines, and possibly Telocaset. A parade will be held at each place, posters distributed, a little warm atmosphere emulated, and the special will advance on its journey.

Baker is planning to give the visitors a royal reception and the visitors will do their best to furnish their part of the entertainment.

Premium List Out.
The classified premium list and racing program were issued this morning, announcing many features of the coming show. The booklet contains 68 pages and is very informing along several lines. George Scibird, secretary of the show, announces that he is now ready to list all classes of entries.

Rules and regulations governing the Union stock show which is a nearby attraction, have been issued.

Entries, Etc.
All applications for entries must be filed with the secretary on or before June 4, 1913. No entry fee will be charged. Free feed and shelter will be furnished to all stock exhibited. In cases where animals are duly registered, such registration certificates must be submitted to the committee for approval prior to judging. Proof of registry must accompany entry.

Make entries early.
All exhibits must be in place not later than 10 a. m., June 5. Exhibits must remain on the show grounds the entire three days. Entries should be made only in name of the owner.

Information for Exhibitors.
Exhibitors will please read the following rules and send their entries in as early as possible. No entry fee will be required to accompany same.

All exhibits must be on the grounds and must be placed and ready for exhibition not later than 10 a. m. June 5.

The exhibition will be open to the public June 5, 6, 7.
Admissions.
The price of admission for adults 50 cents; children under 12 years of age, 25 cents. Admission to grandstand extra. Seats in bleachers free. A free pass will be issued to each exhibitor by applying to the secretary, also to all necessary attendants to stock.

The names of the exhibitors and attendants must be written on the tickets in ink by the secretary, and are positively not transferable under any circumstances.

The single judge system will be the policy of this show, and in every case the judge is selected with the utmost care, and as far as possible, will be of state or national repute.

It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction shall be given any animal that is not deserving.

Colors denoting awards will be as follows:
Royal purple—Championship.
Blue—First.
Red—Second.
White—Third.
The ribbons will be placed on winners immediately after the decision of the judges.

Parade Rules.
Parade will be formed on the grounds and will take place promptly at 12:30 a. m. on each day of the show.

All stock exhibited must take part. It is not the object of this association to dictate to exhibitors when or how they should properly prepare and put their horses and other exhibits in show shape, but perhaps a few words along these lines for better guidance may not be amiss, and

in fact may be somewhat opportune. It is hoped however, that remarks under this heading will be taken by all interested in the same kindly manner in which they are given. For instance, an intending exhibitor may have an excellent animal or animals good enough to exhibit running in his pasture, but if he only gets them up, say a day or two before the show, they are bound to look more or less rough, and not in the best of condition and properly fitted up, while another exhibitor may have animals of the same class in up-to-date show shape, and consequently walks off with the ribbon, whereas if his competitor had only had his animals up to the mark likewise the ribbon might have been his. Attention should be given to all matters in get-

ting a horse in shape for the show in plenty of time, not overlooking the proper shoeing of animals when shoeing is necessary.

Classification.
Any animal can compete in more than one class, and in any and every prize and sweepstake groups or special to which they are eligible under the classification.

All animals pure bred must be registered with the registry association, recognized by the U. S. government, unless otherwise stated in classification. Pure bred animals under one year need not be registered if the sire and dam are registered, as above mentioned.

The association reserves the right to change or modify any rule or rules.

New Golf Links Soon.

Washington, May 22.—Washington, capital of the nation, is to have a public golf course after years of effort toward establishing one by prominent residents and innumerable members of congress who were heretofore always in the majority. Visitors sightseeing here from the states will be permitted to play if they get cards from "their congressmen." This was the announcement made today when Colonel Spencer Crosby, in charge of public buildings and grounds, ordered work started by his office staff on plans for the course. Fifty acres now used by the department of agriculture for experimental work will be turned over for the public golf course, which is to be located in Potomac Park, which is just in the rear of the bureau of engraving and printing where Uncle Sam makes his money, and the monument. The park can be reached from any point in the District of Columbia on a five cent fare.
