Local Merchants Promised Oregon-Grown Strawberries Tomorrow

Oregon strawberries are due to arrive in La Grande tomorrow morning—but not until they are here will the merchants know that promises made are to be fulfilled. There were no shipments received today due to rains in California strawberry beds, but C. M. Secor has gone to Portland and promised to forward to all dealers here consignments of both California and Oregon strawberries. The California variety remains at 20 cents and two for 35, but the Oregon variety prices have not been established, opening, probably, around 25 cents starlight.
