PLANS LONG TRIP IN ROWBOAT

St. Louis Sailor Will Make Voyage of 2,500 Miles Down Mississippi River. Andrew Koehn, a St. Louis sailor, will make a trip of 2,500 miles down the Mississippi river in a rowboat, beginning on June 1. Koehn plans to finish 110 miles south of New Orleans, in the Gulf of Mexico, 100 days later. He will start from Lake Itaska, Clearwater county, Minn., and will make the trip alone. The boat will be of metal, nine feet long and three feet wide. Koehn expects to do most of the rowing by night. He is five feet eight inches tall and weighs 160 pounds.

TO TRY LONG SWIM.

Three Americans to Attempt to Cross English Channel.

Several American swimmers are proposing to attempt to swim the English channel within the next few months. Among those said to have their eyes upon the goal, which the world's best swimmers have always held to be a supreme test, are Charles Durborow of Philadelphia, Joseph M. Callahan of Pittsburgh and Benjamin Schlomberg. Durborow is an amateur and a member of the Philadelphia Swimming club. The other two men are life savers.

Durborow's most recent big swim was over a course of twenty miles in Delaware bay last summer under conditions which witnesses said made the feat equal both in distance and difficulties to the classic channel swim. Callahan has wished for some time to show his prowess abroad and has been preparing for it by many long swims off Atlantic City.

Schlomberg has openly challenged any swimmer in the world for a race across the channel in the early part of May, notwithstanding that the channel waters at that time are generally regarded as too cold for the feat. Both Callahan and Durborow have written abroad in negotiation for races in July and August, respectively.

NAP PITCHER A LINGUIST.

Youngster Can Abuse Umpire in Three Different Languages.

Since Luke Glavench became a member of the Cleveland Naps the conjectures have been many, no doubt, in regard to his nationality. The name didn't sound exactly American, reasoned a good many. Of what parentage might this stalwart right hand pitcher be, all ask.

Glavench is of Slavonian ancestry, his father coming from that little country in Austria-Hungary which at present writing is sending hosts of soldiers to fight the Turks.

Up to the time he was four years old Luke himself could not speak a word of English. After that he got out among the town boys and soon learned the Anglo-Saxon tongue. He speaks Slavonian with all the fluency of a native of his father's country and knows Italian almost as well.

There are many Italians in Jackson, Cal., and as Glavench was thrown among them more or less from boyhood, he learned to handle their language almost as well as English, and his own.

HORSE RACING IN NEW YORK.

Sport Will Be Revived at Belmont Park May 30.

Horse racing is to be revived in New York state. This assurance was given recently in an announcement by the Jockey club that an "owners' fund" had been subscribed to provide proper purses and that renewal of racing would be inaugurated with a meeting at Belmont park, beginning May 30.

At the close of the Belmont park meeting on July 5 a twelve day meeting will be opened on the Jamaica track. Following this there will be racing at Saratoga all the month of August.

"Should conditions warrant, autumn meetings may be considered," says the announcement. It is probable, it was learned, that there will be fall racing at the Aqueduct and Empire City tracks, as well as at Belmont park and Jamaica again.

It is understood that from \$2,000 to \$2,500 is to be added to all stakes and \$1,000 to selling stakes.
