FIRST BANANA CAR ARRIVES

LA GRANDE GROCERY COMPANY GETS SHIPMENT.

Bulk of the Consignment Goes Into Ripening Rooms Here.

La Grande's first carload lot of bananas reached the city today and is being put on the market—such bunches as are ripe—and sent to the La Grande Grocery company ripening rooms in the company's wholesale quarters. General Manager Stutchel of Baker, and Local Manager Emahiser are personally supervising today the storage of the bananas that go to the ripening rooms. These are said to be the first and best of their kind in this section of the state. The room is kept absolutely dark, and to certain degrees of heat, depending on the haste with which the fruit has to be ripened. The carload brought about 300 bunches of bananas, and several portions were ready for the market the moment of their arrival.

Since the advent of the wholesale grocery houses in this city, carload shipments of most commodities of foodstuffs have come to be a usual procedure, but the present carload of bananas is the first the La Grande Grocery company has had shipped here, feeling that the demand for distribution here such a step.
