SPUDS BREAK EVEN WITH BEARS BY WINNING SUNDAY

Walla Walla, May 25.—Featured by the sensational fielding of both teams, Walla Walla and La Grande battled nine full innings here today, the Spuds winning out in their first half of the ninth, when they tied the score on two errors, tow stolen bases and a lucky hit after two were out.

It was Shader's own errors that cost him the game, although he pitched a good game otherwise, and was entitled to win. Both times he attempted to cover first when Sheely was fielding, he fumbled the throws, which would have been out and which lost the game.

It was one of the best exhibitions of baseball for eight innings ever seen here, both teams playing brilliant ball behind the steady pitching of both Shader and Fitchner. Kelly in right field for the Bears speared a long fly by Fitchner which almost went over the fence. Davis made a beautiful bare-handed stop of a hot

grounder directly over second, cutting off what might have been a run. Corbin, Naughton and Miller all three played a great game while the hitting of Fitchner was a feature.

La Grande's hits were well scattered by Shader only one of them being made in the ninth when their scoring was done. Neither team earned their scores.

The Bears ran the first man across the plate in the seventh when Davis walked, stole second, took third on a wild pitch by Fitchner and scored on Sheely's long sacrifice fly to right field, when Beck could not return in time to shut off the run at the plate.

There was nothing doing in the eighth and the game seemed cinched for Walla Walla but in the ninth, Beck got first on Shader's error of Sheely's throw, was sent to second on Miller's grounder, Miller being thrown out at first. Beck stole third and Jamison, pinch hitter for Walters, struck out, and with two down, the fans started to leave the grandstand. At this stage however Fitchner hit between second and third, scoring Beck. He stole third and took second on Shader's error at first in receiving a throw and scored on the same play. Fitchner's hit was pure luck, as the ball was sent squarely at Davis but hit a pebble and bounced several feet over his head.

Walla Walla came near scoring in their half when Davis sent out a two bagger but Fitchner tightened up and shut them out.

PARK MAIN PIPE BROKEN

WATER FROM FOUR-INCH PIPE
HAS ENTERED RIVER.

Water Department Discovers Break
When They Turn on Park Pipes.

A four-inch wooden pipe carrying water to the city park, and passing under the river, has washed away and for a week or so the stream has been playing into the river. Saturday afternoon Water and Sewer Superintendent Hoyt went to the park to give service of water to the contractors who are to erect the new buildings there, and found no water forthcoming. Investigation disclosed that two lengths of the pipe had been washed away when the spring freshets played on the new channel caused by the building of the bridge last summer. The waste has been stopped and some provision to get water to the park during the Chautauqua will be made. The contractors will be required to get their water from the river for cement work.

The loss of water has had a tendency of thoroughly cleaning out the system north of the track affirms the water department and no serious harm has been done.
