DAD GIMLIN QUILTS BOISE

VETERAN OGDEN LEADER IS DISSATISFIED.

"Dad" Clark to Immediately Take Leadership of Team There.

Boise, May 27.—The Statesman said this morning:

Dad Gimlin has resigned as manager of the Boise baseball club, and will no longer have any connection with the Irrigators. He handed his resignation to President Bossner Monday afternoon. Fred Clark, the veteran first baseman, will temporarily take charge of the team and act as manager until the directors of the club decide on what they want to do.

Gimlin's resignation was voluntary. He resigned because in his opinion the fans did not want him any longer. For some time past the patrons of the game have been subjecting Gimlin to one of those panings that come to a manager at times—often from entirely inexplicable causes.

On this occasion the fans seemed to feel that Dad was not getting all he should receive in efficiency from the club. Considerable adverse criticism has been directed against him and Gimlin handed in his resignation.

Gimlin insists. President Bossner did not wish to receive it, but Gimlin insisted and the president of the club had to accept it. Clark will immediately take charge of the club. A meeting of the directors will be held at once and at that meeting it will be decided whether Clark is to be left in charge or some other manager secured.

Gimlin refused Monday night to discuss his resignation. He has had several baseball positions offered him, but he will not accept any of them. He intends to remain in Boise for a week or 10 days and then leave on a hunting and fishing trip to be gone about a month. He will then return to his home in Ogden.

"Heck" McInnis has been told to be ready to come to Boise at a moment's notice. Someone on the pitching staff now is destined to be let go it is reported, and if the let go occurs McInnis will be called to Boise.

With Pittman having taken French leave from the Irrigator's camp, the Gimlin force is short handed leaving it with the same amount of winning pitchers that La Grande has so the handicap on both sides should be annuled and the two teams be on an equal basis this week.

A few days ago on the home lot Beck saw a high one coming when he was playing close in and he turned and beat it for the fence without looking back. Having crawled from fourth place in the percentage column to within a few points of second, the Pendleton Bauckaroos arrived home this morning on the early train and today are resting up for the six game series with Walla Walla. McKune and his men won both series they played while away from home, annexing four of the six played at Baker and the same number at Boise.—Pendleton E. O.
