DEPRESSIONS IN PORTLAND REACH INTERIOR.

Sudden Bear Attack on Portland Prices Yesterday Has Effects.

Depressions in the meat packing circles of Portland caused by the heavy influx and unloading of beef from northwest points following the arrival of Australian meat, are bound to be felt in interior points. The severe bearish movement in Portland yesterday has its effects here because the depression is sure to last more than a day. Up and down gyrations in Portland that last for an hour of two, or even a day, do not reach the interior points, but where such heavy falls occur as did yesterday, is sure to last long enough to effect the prices here.
