Barbara Frietche Reburied.

Frederick, Mr., May 30.—The remains of Barbara Frietche, heroine of Whittier's stirring war poem, and those of her husband, John C. Freitche, were buried today with impressive ceremonies at Mount Olivet cemetery. The remains recently were disinterred from the Old Reformed cemetery here, and rested in state in the Mount Olivet mausoleum until today. Miss Medora Mantz, grandniece of Barbara Freitche, recited Whittier's poem and the local Grand Army acted as a guard of honor.

K. of C. Lead Services.

Philadelphia, May 30.—While fifty thousand, with bowed heads uncovered, knelt on the heights of Overlook Hill today, a solemn mass of requiem was offered for the country's heroes who fell in its wars. It was Philadelphia's observance of Memorial Day. Knights of Columbus from various parts of the state and high church dignitaries from Philadelphia and Pittsburgh conducted the field mass, which was the first ever held in or near Philadelphia. Lined in columns before the massive out-door altar were veterans of the Civil war and Spanish-American war. Just back of the veterans were two regiments of state militia, patriotic societies and other citizen-military organizations.

Kit Carson Honored.

Trinidad, Colo., May 30.—A magnificent bronze statue of Kit Carson, pioneer, soldier, scout, and trapper, was dedicated in Kit Carson Park today, under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, Daughters of the American Revolution and other patriotic societies. The statue cost \$13,000 and is the work of August Lukeman, of New York.

Washington Celebration Extensive. Washington, May 30.—Official Washington paid tribute today to the dead defenders of the nation. All departments were closed and even in the stress of legislative work at the Capitol there was a brief recognition of Memorial day.

Arlington Cemetery, the government's reservation for the soldier and sailor dead, was the scene of impressive exercises this afternoon. Every veterans' grave was decorated with the flag of the country they served, and with flowers. A mass of blossoms lay about the pile of granite raised to the "unknown dead."

At Mount Olivet Cemetery the Irish-American society held special services commemorative of the illustrious dead of the Irish race. G. A. R. Posts and Spanish War Veterans paraded Pennsylvania avenue this morning.

Friedmann to Leave New York.

New York, May 30.—Dr. Friedmann has returned an announced that he will not contest the mandate of the board of health which prohibits him inoculating patients with tuberculosis serum in New York. He will immediately close his institute here, but will proceed with treatments elsewhere and attempt to demonstrate its efficacy.

Haverford in Dock.

Queenstown, May 30.—The Haverford, which went aground on Cork Head with more than 900 passengers, was taken off the rocks at high tide today. The vessel was kept afloat by vigorous use of pumps, and was towed into harbor. The crew remained aboard and passengers returned to Queenstown, proceeding to Philadelphia on the steamer Baltic.

Bandits Take Payroll.

Lasalle, Ill., May 30.—Search is on for four masked bandits who held up a party in charge of the payroll of the Illinois Zinc company near here, killing one and wounding three others. F. D. Richmond saved six thousand of the payroll by a wild dash under fire of the bandits. At Peru today four men, supposedly the Lasalle bandits, were overpowered.

Wilson Breaks Another One.

Washington, May 30.—President Wilson broke another precedent when he failed to speak at the memorial day exercises at the Arlington National cemetery. Instead he toured Virginia in an automobile.

THE SAME OLD SEASONS.

They Are Just About as They Were a Couple of Centuries Ago.

The belief of many people that the seasons are undergoing some kind of change has led Professor Ignazio Galli to examine the weather records of the entire eighteenth century.

The investigations of Professor Galli show fifty-one winters that lasted well into spring, thirty-one warm winters, thirteen unusually early winters, twelve mild winters followed by cold springs, eleven mild winters followed by mild springs, eleven cold autumns, eight very warm springs, eight summers with frosts and five very warm autumns. There was one instance of six consecutive warm seasons. More than three-quarters of the periods of unusual weather occurred between the middle of autumn and the end of spring. Many times during the eighteenth century the same apparent anomalies recurred at the same seasons in several successive years. In every case the seasons regained their normal characteristics.

There have always been persons who imagined that the seasons were becoming warmer or colder than before. There is, however, small foundation for such beliefs. The world has indeed experienced many cold summers and many warm winters, but such seasons are not the rule, but the exception.—Youth's Companion

NOT AFRAID OF COFFINS.

Among the Chinese They Are Gladly Accepted as Presents.

Some one who knows Chinese people very well once told a tale to show that they do not permit themselves the luxury of nerves. She said she had gone one day, before the Boxer riots, to visit an old lady who lived out in the country far beyond Weihai. When the American woman arrived the old lady was out, but presently she came in and announced that she had just been out "watching the men dig her grave, but as it began to rain she had told them to wait for a pleasant day." She did not die for years after that, but she had the comforting assurance that her grave was ready for her without any unseemly haste whenever she cared to occupy it.

The same American had the experience of sleeping in a room with a very large coffin when she was visiting a Chinese friend, and the next morning the old grandfather of the family called her attention to its excellence and explained that his son had made him a present of it. "Isn't the wood fine!" he asked admiringly. "It cost a lot of money." Old people accept such presents as marks of filial love, and not at all as a hint for them to occupy the coffin.—New York Post

Relax in the Water.

Lew Sarett explains the difficulty which the nonswimmer has in remaining afloat in "The Knack of Learning to Swim," in Outing, as follows:

"The nonswimmer, fearing the water, very naturally tenses his muscles as he struggles to keep his head above the water until he is as hard as a rock, and, like a rock, he sinks, whereas the swimmer, having no fear, relaxes his muscles and hence becomes buoyant. The explanation is a simple physical one. Tense, taut muscles increase the specific gravity of the body and make it sink in water; loose, relaxed muscles (given an ordinary supply of air in the lungs) will make the body float."

miles and lucrative contracts for the drivers who finish among the first ten spurred the racers to even greater speed.

With the racers streaking past at a 100-mile an hour clip the public was on the lookout for accidents and possibly deaths.

The brick track is so perfect and so scientifically banked at the turns that danger from accidents is minimized. The drivers here have been practicing on the course for weeks. Pit crews have been practicing making repairs until today new tires were put on in less than two minutes and other repairs in corresponding low time.

A new feature appreciated by the public was the color scheme used on the cars. In addition to numbers each car was designated by a different striking color. It was much easier to distinguish the machines as they tore around the big course. Ambulances were stationed at convenient points and a large corps of doctors and trained nurses were in charge of the central hospital and emergency hospitals established on the grounds. The policing of the park was ably performed by 350 picked military men under the command of a state militia captain and twelve commissioned officers. A justice court was in session all day on the grounds and gamblers and other offenders were given short shift. There were also several hundred city and special police and private detectives.

Jap Envoys Diplomatic.

Sacramento, May 30.—When the Japanese envoys, Sebar and Ahattori, who came to California to study conditions which inspired the passage of the anti-alien act, visit Governor Johnson, it will be purely an informal call, they declared. They are desirous that no impression be gained by California that their conference with the executive, if one is arranged, be regarded as an official act.
