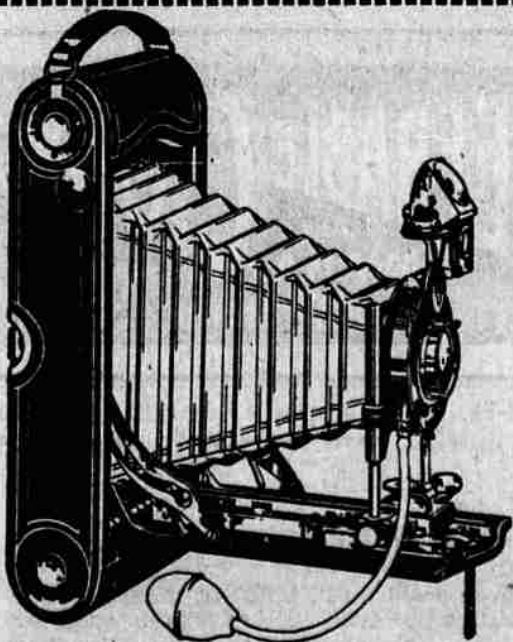

**PEARY IN FRANCE**  
Will Be Entertained by Famous Society There.

Paris, June 2.—Admiral Robert E. Peary, the arctic explorer, will arrive here this week in response to an invitation addressed to him by the French Geographical society.

A great reception awaits him. He will be received by the society in solemn seance at the Sorbonne and on June 6 will deliver a public address in the enormous amphitheatre of the famous institution.

Many believe the French society would have ignored the presence of Peary in France had there not been something of a popular clamor for his official recognition. He is said to have strong opponents in the society, not that they do not believe that he reached the North pole, but are piqued because he failed to submit his proofs to the French society at the time he honored the British.

Dr. Jean Charcot, the Antarctic explorer, is one of Peary's most ardent supporters and he has several times expressed astonishment at the society's failure to take some action honoring Peary. The fact that he is now to be received and fêted by the society is regarded as a sort of victory for Peary.

When Peary landed at Marseilles some weeks ago the French Geographical society took no part in his welcome to French soil, though the society is the oldest in France and one of the oldest in the world. The Marseilles society fêted the American and apparently his reception in France was to begin and end there.

Paris newspapers, however, began a campaign in Peary's favor, it developing that a certain very small faction of the French Geographical society, said to be headed by one of the officers, resented Peary's action in submitting his proofs to the British society and not to the French society. When officials of the society were asked if Peary was to be invited to Paris, the reply was:

"Peary has not asked to be received!"

This statement came as something of a bombshell. Peary, then, would have to ask that he be invited, people exclaimed! Then the French Geographical society might as well shut up shop and go home if that was all they were waiting for, certain of the newspapers intimated, Peary not being that kind of an explorer.

A new society formed for the purpose of bringing well known foreigners to Paris to lecture, fearing that Peary was to be utterly ignored by the French Geographical society, invited him to come here and deliver an address. But in the meantime the newspaper campaign had borne fruit. After discussing the question for some little time, it was unanimously decided by the members of the Geographical society to invite the American to Paris.

**Famous Authors as They Died.**  
Literary men as a rule die nobly. They seem to meet death with philosophical quietude, as did the great Victor Hugo. Rousseau, it is said, when dying ordered his attendants to place him before the window that he might once more behold the setting sun and take his farewell of earth. Petrarch was found dead in his library with his head upon a book. Barthelmy was reading Horace, we are informed, when, his hand becoming cold, he dropped the book, his head inclined to one side, and he seemed only to sleep. His nephew, however, discovered that he was dead. Bayle expired while correcting the proof sheets of his dictionary. Weller died repeating some lines of Vergil. Although taken away in the "midst of life," Keats' end did not come so suddenly. When near death he was asked by a friend how he felt.

"Better, my friend," said he. "I feel the daisies growing over me!"

**Dyeing Natural Flowers.**  
"Every once in awhile some florist gets busy and puts some odd colored blossoms in his window as an extra attraction to the display," said a clubman. "I just noticed one down the street. It consisted of a bunch of impossibly green carnations. At first glance a good many people thought they were made of paper, but they got interested when they found out that they were natural." Now, anybody who wants to have any of these freak flowers can get them by buying some kind of aniline ink, any color desired. Carnations are the easiest to color—white ones, of course. Put their stems in a glass filled with ink. Their stems are soft, and in a short while the larger veins in their petals are filled with the ink. Don't let them absorb too much color. They are prettier with just so much. Then remove them and put them in a vase of salt water."—Philadelphia Record.
