HAIR CUT UNMILITARY

Long Hair Leads to Arrest of German Soldier at Dresden.

Berlin, June 2.—Soldiers in Germany have been punished for many offenses but for the first time on record a soldier has been court-martialed for an "unmilitary haircut." A "military haircut," it should be stated, is one of the convict-like, closely clipped style.

It was reported to the captain of a detachment at Dresden that one of his men named Mideck had unseemly long hair for a soldier. The captain ordered a general haircut of the attachment. The sergeant conveyed the captain's order to the offender saying, "You will have your hair cut real short." Mideck replied, "I will not have my hair cut real short. I am in the army, not in a prison. Besides, I had my hair cut only yesterday."

Mideck was amazed when he found he was charged with insubordination and lack of respect to his superiors. The court-martial decided he should have obeyed the order to cut his hair in the style desired, found him guilty and gave him 16 days arrest.

Women Criticize Men.

Paris, June 2.—What failing is the most detestable in the modern young man? A Paris weekly with an enormous circulation among the fair sex asked its readers the question. The result was:

France Swells Army.

Paris, June 2.—The military maxims of Napoleon are now being used as arguments in favor of the proposed three-year army-service law, by which device France hopes to secure an army large enough to cope with that of Germany. A collection of his sayings has just been issued in book form. Here are some of them:

"All Frenchmen should consider the law of conscription as necessary and sacred if they do not wish to see their homes devastated."

"The art of war consists in exaggerating one's own forces and minimizing those of the enemy."

"To be mentioned in the dispatches is worth a hundred volumes of Cicero or Demosthenes. The 32nd would have died for men to a man because after Lonato I wrote: 'The 32nd was there and I was at ease.'"

Make Them Into Ensigns.

Annapolis, June 2.—Higher mathematics and lessons on how to make war at sea were forgotten by Uncle Sam's future admirals today when graduation exercises started. Parents of senior middies are here from every state to attend the receptions, dress parades and an evening performance by masked middies on today's program. Diplomas, which will transform the midshipmen into full-fledged ensigns will be presented at graduation on Friday, when Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels will make the principle address.

"Hookey" is the Cause.

Washington, June 2.—Because the opening of the district's "swimming hole" heretofore has been accompanied by wholesale cases of "hookey," Superintendent Hodson announced today that on school days boys of school age will not be allowed to "go swimming" until after three o'clock the closing hour for Washington's schools.

A Floating Court.

Washington, June 2.—The revenue cutter service was advised today that the cutter Thetis, the only floating court in the United States, sailed today from Seattle, Wash., for Alaska waters. A special court will sit

aboard the revenue cutter to clear up 11 cases which have accumulated since the close of navigation last fall.

STOCKS SHAKY TODAY.

Canadian Pacific Clumps, Followed by Union Pacific Decline.

New York, June 2.—The stock market opened with an average drop of a point in the leading issues today. Canadian Pacific opened at eighth and five-eighths under Thursday's close. Unfavorable financial conditions in Canada is given as the cause of weakness in Canadian Pacific.

Later the Canadian figures broke a point and a half below the opening. This was followed by a decline of three and three-quarters in Union Pacific.

Sentiment Always Public.

London, June 2.—Declaring that the public is swayed more by sentiment than judgment, Dr. James Oldfield, speaking at a meeting of the Society for the Abolition of Capital Punishment, urged members of the society to seize on some sentimental murder case to drive home their principles. He said that there had been no executions in Belgium since the beheading of an innocent man and he asked for a volunteer who would suffer an unjust death penalty for the benefit of the cause. There were no martyrs forthcoming.

More Wages Asked.

Kansas City, June 2.—Resolutions asking increases in wages were to be introduced before the convention of the International Association of Marble Workers which convened today. Representatives from nearly every state in the union were in attendance.

ENGLISH WOMEN MILITANT

Refuse to Pay Taxes Until the Have a Voice in Government.

London, June 2.—Tax resistance as a mean of protest against the failure of the British government to grant woman suffrage is spreading throughout the country among women who are reluctant to employ the more violent Panhurstian methods.

Following the recent "selling up" of household goods belonging to Miss Beatrice Harraden, distinguished suffragist and author of 'Ships taht Pass in the Night,' at Kilburn, because she refused to pay her income tax, scarcely a day has passed without reports of similar instances from some section or other. Under the motto of "No Taxation Without Representation," the membership of the Women's Tax Resistance League is increasing by hundreds weekly. Public meetings are being held in all the larger cities of the United Kingdom, under the league's auspices, at which women are pledging themselves to

pay no form of tribute to the government "until they shall have obtained a voice in making the laws under which taxes are assessed against them."

Members of the league in large numbers attended tax resistance sales today at Romford, Islington, and Battersea, and paraded the streets afterwards with banners displaying their Boston Tea Party war-cry.

Dog Worries Police.

Berlin, June 2.—A tragic-comic "siege" in which it took 11 policemen armed with swords and automatic pistols, three hours to kill a dog, occurred here on Klopstock St. A woman owned a gigantic Newfoundland dog of which she was very fond despite the fact that he was so fierce he had to be muzzled even in the house. Returning from shopping, she was attacked by the animal which had succeeded in getting the muzzle off. An alarm brought a police detail of six men and a lieutenant. It was reported that the dog was mad. Shots through the window missed the lively target. Next a poisoned bologna was thrown into the room. The dog sniffed at it contemptuously. Reinforcements were sent for. Four more police and several dog catchers from the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals responded. After two hours further maneuvering, the dog was shot.

Leave for Mines.

Cleveland, O., June 2.—Twenty-five students of the mining engineering department of the Case School of Applied Science, left here today for Butte, Mont., Anaconda, Mont., and points in Colorado where they will study the practical side of their profession and engage in research work.
