*Memorial day game with Wallowa 11-5, Enterprise losing, has been declared scheduled game, in lieu of postponed game early in the season. "Little Eva" Bilyeu had little trouble getting away with the Moose last Sunday when the Enterprise fellows ruthlessly walked off with the bleeding antlers of the local Moose in an 8-3 score. The game was loose, poorly played and lacking in interest, and the big county clerk had little occasion to stretch himself. Foster was injured the evening before the game and could not work and Conley failed to show up, weakening the battery considerably. Oliver, however,

went to the hill and in his justice it must be said that he didn't lose the game for the Moose—two-thirds of the team took a hand in throwing it away. The Moose battery was drafted at the last moment and both did their best. Oliver did very well and with usual Moose support would have given Bilyeu a run for his money. The local batters found the big heater for enough hits to win but not at opportune time generally. The big blowup came in the second inning when four singles, three errors, two bases on balls and a wild pitch and a passed ball, the visitors rang the bell five times. After that it was a better game but the lead was too wide. Stackey singled in the third; appropriated second and scored on Lee's error preventing a kalsomine. In the fifth inning Oliver doubled and scored on Pidcock's single and in the ninth inning the Moose started a rally that brought one score and nothing more—Akin's drive to center field was juggled and Oliver's bingle to right field fell by the way side allowing Akin to come home without trouble. With McInnis or Foster on the hill and the veteran Conley at the receiving end, Enterprise has no license to defeat the Moose, though the visitors have a well balanced team at that.
