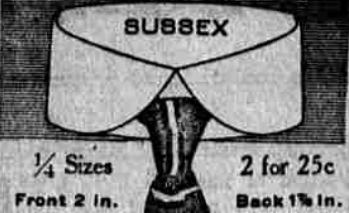


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SPUDS LOSE AGAINST YAKS**JAMISON NOT IN FORM AT NORTHERN TOWN.**
