BULGARIAN CABINET QUILTS.

Believed Danoff Will Form New Cabinet and Avert Clash.

London, June 3.—Dispatches tell of the resignation, late last night, of the Bulgarian cabinet. If the report is true it is believed possible the Greek-Bulgarian clash will be averted by Dr. Danoff, the Bulgarian peace delegate who is expected to for the new ministry.

Pelky Trial is Set.

Springfield, Mo., June 4.—William McCarney, manager of the late Luther McCarthy received notice today that the arial of Arthur Pelkey, McCarney's opponent in the fatal contest, and Tommy Burns, the promoter, on charges of manslaughter in connection with the death of McCarthy in Calgary, will begin June 13rd.

Paris, June 4.—American women took a prominent part in today's sessions of the great International Women's Congress which has been in convention here two days and will continue through Saturday. Important speeches made today were on the great good which has come in the way of legislation in those of the United States which have granted the franchise to women, on child hygiene and on the part women should play in sociological work. One of the features of today's session was the promised announcement that the National Council of Frenchwomen, under whose auspices the congress is being held, has resolved to begin immediately a strenuous campaign for votes for women throughout France. The announcement was enthusiastically received. It was tentatively planned that prominent English and American speakers will be engaged to aid in the promised campaign for votes for women of France. The congress is the tenth annual one held by the international group of women's organizations.

Begins Five Year Term.

Trieste, Austria, June 4.—M. Sterle, a 17-year-old student who recently issued a manifesto to the inhabitants of Trieste to revolt, declare a republic and continue the work begun by the student, Oberdank, today began service of a five year term to which he was sentenced on a charge of high treason. Oberdank was hanged 30 years ago for attempting to assassinate Emperor Franz Joseph.

Treaty Expired Today.

Washington, June 4.—Uncle Sam's arbitration treaty with Great Britain, which has been in force since 1906, and under which the questions as to the Newfoundland fisheries dispute and the Alaskan seal controversy were settled, expired today. A new treaty will probably be considered immediately by the diplomats of England and America. If one is put through to take the place of the old one, it will be the first during W. J. Bryan's term as secretary of state.

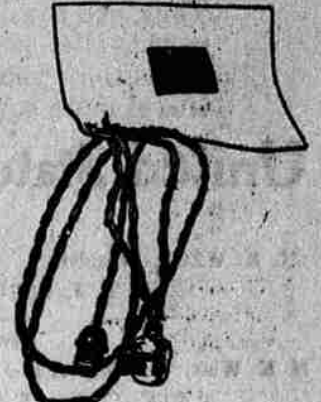
