BERRY CROP IS HALF SIZE

TOO MUCH HEAT SAID TO BE CAUSE

Portland Field Strawberries Have an Off Year.

Portland, June 5.—The strawberry crop of Oregon promises only a half yield at this time, and a further decrease in the output is expected in some quarters. The recent warm weather has cooked a large per cent of the fruit, besides forcing another big per cent to maturity at too rapid a pace.
 The result is that the berries from practically all sections are not up to standard quality; have little if any taste, and are generally of small size.
 Most of the complaint that has been made against the berries this season has been in the Gold Dollar. These have been arriving mostly in poor shape, and some very low prices have been named in consequence. Only a few sections have sent forward Gold Dollar this season in good condition, but these have brought best prices.
