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RACE MEETING SPARKLES

and to this winner will go the Farrel loving cup, the prize of the show. Roy Peebler captured first honors in the jumping competition guiding John clear of the five foot mark. W. F. Hutchinson received second, and Mr. Henry, riding Nibs, third awards. Following these contests the racing program was carried off in a clock work regularity. The Union show is a mixture of the wild west, the old county stock exhibit, and the modern race meet, making a program interesting to all as well as very unique. First among the novelties in the racing events was the one-eighth mile dash for Shetland ponies won by John Conley, Sam Ritchie taking second, Walter Hogan, third, and Archie Simmons, fourth.

The special events for the day were the riding of bucking horses by Hank McGrath and Harry Hasbrock, Hogg's gritty attempt to ride the bucking bull, and a free for all mule

race in which the entries had to be driven across the line.

In the quarter mile dash Sammy Mullen owned by H. N. Peach and ridden by Clarke won first in the good time of :35 1/2, Billy Wallace, owned by John Spain and ridden by Turk taking second, and Able Thatcher, owned by Tom Brady and ridden by Craine, third.

In the gentleman's relay race which was to be 12 1/2 miles, each rider to ride each of his five horses five half mile laps, making 25 changes, one of Fred Spain's horses gave out on the 15th lap, thereby forfeiting the race to Herford who was riding Conley's string. Herford's time for 16 laps was 19 minutes and 20 seconds. Spain will attempt to get a new horse for today's relay. Ben Corbett narrowly escaped of a serious accident in attempting to stop one of Spain's mounts at the finish of the 11th lap. The horse knocked him to the ground and luckily missed stepping on him as he broke away. Corbett's escape, however, furnished excellent material for the moving picture man who was lucky enough to be in line for the tumble.

With 14 entries in the half-mile cowboy race a close finish resulted in Bill Wilson winning first in 58 1/2, and Mr. White taking second. White's mount was rapidly gaining at the finish and then lost only by a nose length.

In the mile and half ladies' relay Maudie Ausburn brought the crowd to its feet when she passed Mrs. Pierce in the last lap, winning in 2:45. Miss Auburn rode for H. W. B. Smith, and Mrs. Pierce rode for F. H. Pierce. Both riders gained the admiration of the crowd through their able horsemanship.

The feature among features of the days' events was the chariot race run in two divisions. In the first heat Lou Smith beat H. W. B. Smith in 1:05, while in the second race Zip Morris, driven by John Spain passed and won from E. O. Ziek, in the remarkable time of :58 1/2. Excited beyond control at this thrilling spectacle the crowds lost themselves in the enthusiasm of this climax to the days successful program.

Officials are Experts.

The officials of the Union stock show have always been unusually successful in securing the services of an excellent specialist as judge of exhibits. Prof. E. J. Iddings of the Idaho University, is the authority on the job for the present show and his high recommendations are fully equaled by his excellent work. The judges of the races are well known throughout the northwest as being the most capable men for that capacity that can be obtained. They are A. Schultz of Portland, Roy Konklun of Wallowa, Frank Craig of Union, and official timer, E. G. Cameron of Union. A. G. Paddock of Union is the official veterinarian for the show.

Great Picture for "Movies."

Under the direction of J. R. Willis, the Oregon Moving Picture company is on the ground taking complete pictures of the show. During the past week they have been out in the real stock country taking pictures of real conditions on the Union county ranges. 100 head of horses were "shot" on Townley's ranch, and pic-

tures of 300 head of cattle were secured from the Benson Bros., place. Next week they will take the machine to John Spain's ranges especially to secure the unusual scene of a band of 200 wild horses. Spain's ranch is one of the wildest in the country and some great pictures will be taken while the machine is in that country. After the films have all been arranged Mr. Willis intends to tour the northwest presenting them with a lecture on stock raising in Eastern Oregon.

Notice of Proposed Street Improvement.

To whom it may concern: You are hereby notified that the commissioners appointed by the common council, of the City of La Grande, Oregon, to make an examination of the property, upon which assessments are to be levied to pay the costs and expenses of the street improvement hereinafter described, as to the valuation and extent, if any of the benefits to be derived by said property by reason of said improvement, have made their report in writing to said council, which report has been received by said council, and is on file in the office of the recorder of said city, and is open for your inspection. That it is the intention of said council to levy a special assessment against all the property hereinafter described for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of improving North Second

street between the north line of "W" Avenue and the center of Lake Avenue by laying thereon macadam pavement on the roadway of said street, a width of forty feet, and constructing cement curbs, according to the plans and specifications therefore heretofore adopted by said council and on file in the office of the Recorder of said city.

That the real property included in and the boundaries of the district benefitted and affected by said proposed improvement are as follows:

North Second street and the West half of blocks 3, 4, 7, 8, 11, 15, and 16 and the east half of Blocks 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, and 23, in Riverside Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, and the west half of Block 4 and the east half of Block 9 in Rynearsen's Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, all in the City of La Grande,

Oregon, and the estimated cost of said proposed improvement is \$14,214.30. You will further take notice that said city council will meet at the council chamber in the city building of said city on the 18th day of June, 1913, at 8 o'clock p. m. of said day to consider making the proposed levy and will thenand there grant a hearing to any and all persons felling aggrieved against, or on account of, said proposed assessment.
