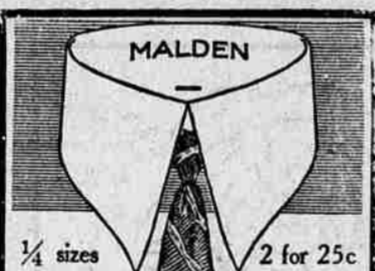

BAKER MILL TO BE REBUILT

BAKER WHITE PINE LUMBER COMPANY RECOUPS.

Improved Type of Mill to be Built Out of Ashes There.

(Baker Herald.)

As if by magic, the Baker White Pine Lumber company will rebuild its planing mill at once, on the site of the one destroyed by fire.

Already architects are on the ground planning for the new structure and machine men are here taking orders for new equipment.

The company plans for a larger and more modern structure than the one burned. The engine room will be built of concrete, 250 feet from the site of the planing mill, and there will be absolutely no danger of fire from the boilers. The mill will be built as near fire proof as is possible.

The loss was estimated at \$90,000. The entire plant was consumed. It was practically covered by insurance.

The planing mill and box factory was one of the best, if not the best equipped in the state. Within the past few days machinery to the value of \$10,000 had been installed. Over 100 men are out of work until the new plant starts.

The fire was discovered by H. J. King, engineer of the company at 5:50 o'clock. He tried to fight it out with a hose and was burned badly about the arms and face. He remained long enough in the fiery furnace to sound the whistle.

Upon the arrival of the department which made the run in one minute and 50 seconds, the flames had spread to all parts of the building and their efforts were devoted to saving the office and outstanding buildings. The entire plant was gone at 6:30 o'clock.

The new dry kiln, recently installed by the company and completely filled with high grade lumber was saved.

The house occupied by Albert Cook and wife, and owned by John Noregard was burned to the ground with the contents, at a loss of \$1000. Cook and his wife are working in the mountains and saved nothing.

Owing to the fire all the mill hands at the company's saw mill at White Pine have been laid off for at least 10 days.
