SUBWAY HAS
DIRECT NOTICEFINAL DESIRES OF COUNCIL IS
SOUGHT.O.-W. Officials Come to Learn What
Is Best Course to Pursue.

To learn what the desires of the city council are in the matter of the North Second street where either a more suitable crossing must be provided or a subway built, Chief of the O.-W. Engineers H. A. The Second street paving project cannot be closed up by the city until the wishes of the railroad company are expressed, without much cost to all concerned, and the emissaries of the railroad are here today to learn what the council deems its wishes in the matter. The company has not said definitely what it will do or contemplates doing, although Mr. Brandon has formerly investigated the feasibility of building a subway there. The school board and parents of children living in the territory affected, have expressed their desire for a subway in which children from the south side of the track could be sent to the new Northside building. The council, however, which will give the suggestion that the railroad company will prob-

ably lend its ears to, has not expressed its desires, and it is likely that a caucus of the councilmen will be held before the officials return to Portland. As soon as it is known what is wanted, the railroad company will act, allowing the completion of the paving project, the failure of which, has caused expenditure of considerable interest money.

MEACHAM MILL
TO BE MOVEDC. W. NIBLEY PICKS NEW SITE
AT AUSTIN.All Timber Cut at Meacham, Necessi-
tating New Location.

With all the timber holdings at Meacham cut off, C. W. Nibley is planning on moving the Meacham mill to Baker. The plan has been under consideration for some time the meantime Mr. Nibley taking options on much land in the vicinity of Austin. Relative to the proposed removal of the mill, a Baker paper of Sunday morning says:

C. W. Nibley Jr., of La Grande, representing the Meacham Lumber company and David C. Eccles, president of the Sumpter Valley railway, went to Austin yesterday to select the site for the new saw mill to be built there at once by the Meacham company. The company recently acquired approximately seventy-two million feet of lumber in the vicinity of Austin from the government and are moving their plant to that place from Meacham, near La Grande, where they have finished their logging operations.

According to Mr. Nibley, the company expects to have the mill in operation in sixty days, the plant at Meacham having already been dismantled ready for removal. When in operation the new plant together with the logging force will employ about sixty men. The mill to be installed will have a daily capacity of approximately 40,000 feet.

tion. Later, in order to determine the truth of his statements, Captain Houghton took him to his home.

Incriminating Note Found.

A search of his person and the premises revealed an undated note, written by the dead girl to her husband, in which she denied charges, evidently made by him and declared that she was going to leave him and that he could get a divorce. This evidence is in direct opposition to his statement that they had never quarreled. Fernando explained that the note had been written and left on his desk a week ago but it was only a small matter and they had made up.

A thorough search of the kitchen floor, where Fernando declared his wife had fallen, failed to show any sign of blood, while both Fernando's hands and his tie were bloodstained. He explained away the stains by saying they were the result of carrying his wife to the bed. No blood could be found on the floor over which he carried the wounded girl

from the dining room to the bedroom. There was no blood on the bedroom floor nor on the bed. When found by the physician the girl lay on her back and from all appearances she was either wounded while on the bed, or fell back on the bed immediately after. When she was taken to the ambulance the knife was found on the bed.

Fernado was lodged in the city jail to await the verdict of the coroner's jury.

"Gentlemen," he declared before being placed in a cell, "I am innocent. I love the girl. She is my wife. I am innocent, but if she should die I want you to hang me."

Later, when informed of his wife's death he broke into tears.

Married Three Months.

Fernado met his wife, who was Ruth Burnett, in La Grande, Oregon, about six months ago and he married her with the reluctant consent of her parents in Portland three months ago. According to his statement she was not quite 17 years of age when they arrived here the first of last May. He has been employed as cigarmaker at Lankester's for the past three weeks. He is a young man, a native-born Spaniard, and speaks with a strong Castilian accent.

Captain Houghton last night telegraphed Mrs. Susana Burnett, of La Grande, mother of the deceased, of her daughter's untimely end.

be much better. Last year, in that borough, there were granted 712 divorces and the number of marriages was 14,567.

In New York county, comprising Manhattan and the Bronx which properly is New York City, there were 1016 divorces and 31,780 marriages, or about one divorce to thirty-one marriages.

In contrast to this record for a city of upwards of 500,000 population, Cincinnati and St. Louis, much smaller are running a close race for high mark in the divorce percentage column. In St. Louis last year 1443 divorces were filed and 1101 granted, an average of one divorce to every six marriages. Cincinnati untied 911 marriages in 1175 suits filed, an average of one divorce to every six marriages.

All of which only goes to show that while Gotham's police record may be unsavory, its general attitude toward the marriage tie is much more respectful on the general average than the attitude of St. Louis and Cincinnati, so give the devil his due.

Rutland, Vermont, June 9.—Arrangements for transporting the civil war veterans of the Green Mountain state to the great anniversary celebration of the battle of Gettysburg at that place July 1 to 4, were made today at the opening session of the preliminary meeting of the annual encampment which opens here tomorrow, to last two days. Tomorrow's encampment will be the 46th annual reunion of the department of Vermont, Grand Army of the Republic Department Commanders Niles and Adjutant General Frank Kenfield, of Morrisville will be in charge of the reunion. Two hundred veterans are expected. A score or more arrived here today.

Tennis Stars Meet.

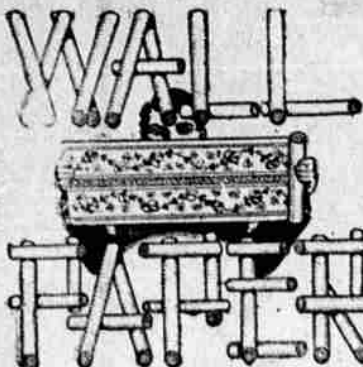
