## ORDERS GIVEN ON DEMURRAGE

### RAILROAD COMMISSION ISSUES REGULATIONS ON DEMURRAGE.

Sends Notice to all Shippers and Commercial Bodies in the State.

In the matter of the adoption of regulations relating to demurrage and reciprocal demurrage, Frank J. Miller, Thos. K. Campbell, and Clyde B. Aitchison, the Oregon railroad commission, have issued the following notice to commercial organizations and shippers at large throughout the state.

Notice is hereby given, that on the 16th day of June, 1913, at the hour of 10:30 o'clock a. m. at the office of the railroad commission of Oregon, in the capitol at Salem, Oregon, the above named railroad commission of Oregon will proceed to adopt and prescribe reasonable rules, orders and regulations for the furnishing of suitable cars within the state of Oregon for the transportation of intra-state freight in carload lots by the several railroads within the state of Oregon, and the time within which and the place at which said cars shall be furnished, the manner of applying therefor, the time and place for the loading and transportation thereof, and the loading thereof, and for demurrage and the amount thereof (not exceeding the sum of \$4.00 for each car per day,) and generally, such rules and regulations as may be designed to require reasonable promptness in the furnishing of cars to be loaded to persons making application therefor, and the loading thereof by application therefor, and the unloading by the consignee, and the reasonable prompt transportation thereof. Such rules, orders and regulations will be so

adopted and prescribed by said commission pursuant to the provisions of Section 6904 of Lord's Oregon Laws, as the same is amended by Chapter

294 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1913. "Any railroad or person interested in the said matter will be heard by

and before the said commission at the said time and place. "Dated at Salem, Oregon, this 4th day of June, 1913."
