Provisions Made for Inner Man During Chautauqua Assembly Period.

The Grande Ronde Chautauqua is no different in this respect than its many sister institutions throughout the land and anyone who has taken the trouble to attend the assembly held annually in Riverside park will attest the truthfulness of this statement. season promises to furnish as good a program as has been given in the past and no fear is entertained but what everyone attending will be fully repaid in the lessons taught thereat.

It will not be necessary to "come back to town" to get something to eat as here will be served a substantial meal at the regular hours. "The Lodge" will be a commodious room provided with a kitchen and

dining room, also with comfortable porches screened in so that they may be used by those wishing to be "outdoors" and yet enjoy a civilized method of being served.

Do not miss any of the program on account of being too hungry to listen but come and share the hospitalities of an institution that is doing great things for the community in which you live.

Those who bring their lunches for a day's visit need not bring coffee as it will be sold hot at reasonable rates.

sion, but all that they have to do is to get the talent and run the show. The Merchants' association sell, the tickets and guarantee all debts, and the fact that they continue in this course from year to year must in itself be an admission that it is of benefit to all parties concerned. Their assemblies are held in Ravine park, which is one mile from the city.

Shelbyville, Ill., Chautauqua was organized by a number of business and professional men raising the sum of \$3,000.00, with which they purchased thirty-three acres for a permanent location. No compensation has ever been asked for, or received for the original outlay, but all surplus funds that have accrued have gone to the upbuilding and maintenance of the association.

Boise, Idaho, has a Commercial club which raised \$3,000 with which to purchase the talent for their first assembly in 1910, and at the close of

the session raised an additional \$1,000 to pay all bills. This has been their plan for the past three years. Columbus, Ind., has about two hundred private citizens who guarantee all expenses.

Tomahawk, Wis., a tiny hamlet in the pine woods that boasts of more than thirty saloons and only one church, guaranteed the expenses of their first assembly in 1911 and have continued to do so since that time.

Devils Lake, N. Dak., has for the past twenty years maintained one of the most important and largely attended assemblies in the entire country. Located at first, in a sparsely inhabited country, several miles from the city, it has become the social center of that great state and annually draws thousands of campers from the entire northwest.

Pacific Grove Chautauqua association is largely financed by a real estate company, the Pacific Improvement company, which has found that the great interest shown by the people of Northern California is a fine thing for the city of Pacific Grove to keep alive. Where the city grows, the reality men thrive, consequently the Pacific Improvement company devotes many hundred dollars annually toward the Chautauqua and consider it good business. The Pacific Grove Chautauqua association by the way is the first offspring of the Mother Chautauqua, and was established in 1879.

The benefits of a Chautauqua include a stimulus to educational interests such as no other agency in the land can begin to imitate. It builds for clean morality by an intelligent and an insistent plea for right doing. It promotes clean politics, and is today the greatest power in non-partisan politics in America. No one is quicker to see the value of aligning himself with this movement than the political self-seeker, and if the management were desirous of appealing to party politics alone, the entire session could be devoted to politicians. Finally, a Chautauqua, as has been proved in many places, stimulates real estate values by greatly enhancing the value of the town as a home locality. The directors of the Grande Ronde Chautauqua wish to interest as many outsiders in our Chautauqua as possible because in so doing, they desire to emphasize the desirability of living in our town. They wish to attract home builders to their city and when they come, one of the things that can be pointed to without one regret or hint of apology, is a
