

WORK BEGINS ON BASEMENT

EXCAVATION FOR NEW CEMENT FLOOR STARTS.

Local Contracts to Make Many Big Improvements On Bldg.

Excellent progress is being made on the very extensive repairs and extensions prepared and contracted for the Jay Brooks building occupied by the N. K. West store. Excavators are sinking the ground floor of the basement under the present structure 18 inches, and extending the excavation back to the alley a distance of 20 feet to make a basement 110 feet long. This entire basement space is to be cemented and as soon as this is done, the erection of the new addition to the building and other extensive repairs, will be commenced. The men's clothing department is to have its roof raised to a level with the rest of the building at the same time that the entire building becomes longer by 20 feet. The proposed new front calls for six up-to-the-minute show windows and two plate glass door entrances.

The basement will be the stock and trunk rooms, display rooms and heating plant.

The main floor is to be cleared entirely for counters for the mezzanine floor is to be enlarged to accommodate all the work rooms, rest room lavatories, wrapping counters and office. This will leave a large clear space for the selling counters, practically doubling the present facilities. The mezzanine floor in the present arrangement is to be enlarged by an addition of about 30 feet to its width giving ample room for all that will be required of it. With these extensive changes in sight, the store promises to become one of the very best accommodated dry goods emporiums in this section.

Home contractors entirely work on the building's improvements. Contractor J. M. Kohl has the main contract and John Melvill the heating and plumbing contract. In this way several local workmen are given employment for a considerable portion of the summer, for the removal of the present front and installation of all new appurtenances will require much time.
