TEAM SENT TO PENDLETON

MANY ORDERS COUNTERMANNED BY SWEET.

Foley Has Claim of \$500 and More Against Caldwell Club.

Amidst orders that commanded and counter commanded, Karl King and some ball players the ownership of whom is not precisely known, left this morning for Pendleton and with the departure of the erstwhile Spuds looms the likelihood of a lawsuit or two with P. A. Foley, president of the La Grande club, as the plaintiff. Yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, the Spuds were under orders to go to Caldwell by night train. At 3:30 Mr. Foley had had a long distance talk with President Sweet and the Spuds were ordered to stay in La Grande and the Bucks ordered home. At 5:30 both teams were instructed to await further orders; this morning both were sent to Pendleton and the managers hustled their teams aboard No. 17 before another order overtook them Caldwell and Pendleton are, therefore playing at Pendleton this afternoon. Washington, June 20.—On recommendation of the Commissioner General of Immigration Caminetti, an amendment to regulations is on file in the department of labor authorizing immigration officials at mainland ports to reject aliens coming from insular possessions unless it should appear at the time of entry they are not members of excluded classes or

likely to become public charges. The modification is against unrestrained admission of Hindus and Malays, several thousand of whom are in the Philippines and Hawaii.
