Virginians Celebrate.

Wheeling, W. Va., June 20.—The presence of Governor Mann, of Virginia, among the principle speakers today which was celebrated as "state day" of West Virginia's semi-centennial week, was taken as final indication that all bitterness existing between the people of the two commonwealths as a result of the division of the state of Virginia during the civil war, has been obliterated. Secretary of State William J. Bryan will be central figure at the ceremonies late this afternoon. Many notables from Washington came here today on a special train. They include many of the Virginia and West Virginia members of congress and ex-Senator Henry Gassaway Davis.
