Pendleton, Ore., June 21.—Peet and Jamison, former teammates on the University of Oregon team, opposed each other in Saturday's game between Pendleton and La Grande and the duel was one worth seeing. There was but little to choose between the two and had it not have been for a 21 minute intermission in the seventh or account of rain, the game would doubtless have ended 1 to 0 for the Buckaroos. As it was both pitchers got out during the recess and Jamison was bumped for four hits and three runs in the last of the seventh while in the ninth Peet went wild and allowed two scores. Final score, Pendleton 4 La Grande 2.

Peet was given better support than the southpaw collegian. An error followed by Byrnes' drive gave the Bucks a lonesome one in the second and when the game was called temporarily in the seventh, the visitors had only made two hits and the locals three. Jamison pitched himself out of several bad holes which his own wildness and poor support put him in. The Sunday game was called in the last of the second on account of rain with the score 1 to 0 in favor of La Grande.

Alcohol Opposed.

London, June 21.—"Entire prohibition of the use of alcohols as instruments of war fare" excluding possibility of a new liquor in civilization is a committee recommendation from the British Peace society for consideration at the next Hague. Other recommendations are a general treaty for obligatory arbitration, a court of immunity for private property at sea, in time of war, abolition of biochemicals in unsterilized parts. Prohibition of explosive mines in waters used by neutral ships, and a check in the growth of armaments.

Special Efforts Fail.

San Francisco, June 21.—Glorious success of Cassin Silver to save the life of her mother through blood transfusion has proved unavailing. The mother died in a hospital. Major Ralph was present at the operation and told Miss Silver that she must be the "best girl in prison."

White Slave Sentenced.

San Francisco, June 21.—Earl Fullerton was sentenced for Federal Judge Farrington to three years at San Quentin on a charge of bringing Vera Sarantov from Seattle for immoral purposes. The woman testified she was deceived in a pretense of marriage.

Valuable School Goods Burn.

San Francisco, June 21.—Sixteen valuable school goods were destroyed.

CHARLTON QUITS FIGHT.

Father Appeals to Bryan That Justice Be Done to Accused Man.

Washington, June 21.—All hope of Porter Charlton to escape extradition to Italy to stand trial for wife murder is gone, following a personal appeal from his father to Secretary Bryan, who was assured that the state department will instruct officials to see that justice is done otherwise the department is helpless. Young Charlton is held at Etchoban and is said to be suffering with advanced tuberculosis. It is not believed the father will make an appeal to President Wilson on this ground.

MORE NOMINATIONS IN

Ministers and Land Office Officials Nominated by Wilson.

Washington, June 21.—President Wilson has sent the following nominations to the senate: Minister to Netherlands at Luxembourg, Dr. Henry Vandribe; minister to Bolivia, John Oscar of Missouri; receiver of public moneys at Glasgow, Edward Hargadaine; register of land office at Glasgow, Thomas Jones.

McLAUGHEY SHOWS FIGHT.

Lucky Baldwin's Heiress to Help Fight for Her Children.

Los Angeles, June 21.—A change of venue to San Francisco is asked by Hill McLaughry in the divorce suit brought by his wife, Anita Baldwin McLaughry, heiress to "Lucky" Baldwin. This is McLaughry's first move in the suit brought two weeks ago. It indicates he will bitterly contest the attempt of his wife to gain possession of the two children.

Bandit Commits Suicide.

Madison, Wash., June 21.—J. H. Ethel shot himself at his home in a lumber town after holding a posse away for hours. Two deputies, unidentified were killed before the man, wanted on a charge of arson, took his own life.

Vanderbilt Wins "Marathon."

London, June 21.—Alfred G. Vanderbilt, driving his own coach, won the International coaching marathon.
