The manufacturers and merchants had chartered the boat for themselves and families and for Western New York and Pennsylvania customers who came here as their guests. The seaandbee is the largest side wheel passenger steamer on the Great Lakes. It is 500 feet long and 97 feet 8 inches wide. She will accommodate 6,000 passengers and can make 22 miles per hour. The visitors expect to return to Cleveland tonight.
