Vollmer stated Dunn will not be prosecuted. Friends of the author are offering to redeem the jewelry. The brooch was recovered without identity of the owner being known.

RECORD FOR STRAWBERRIES

Undoubtedly the Grande Ronde valley has the record for large strawberries as shown by L. Stillwell, a grower of May Park, who brought to this office a box containing two dozen berries (24) that weighed without the box, just two pounds and three ounces. Some of the largest ones may be seen in show window of J. H. Peare's jewelry store, preserved in alcohol.

Mr. Stillwell says he has produced in past seasons now and then a berry as large as some of the largest of this exhibit but he never before experienced a year when the crop contained so many large ones.
