

SENIOR CAMINETTI HELD UNFIT TO HOLD HIS POST Diggs and Caminetti to be Prosecuted at Los Angeles

Washington, June 26.—The house judiciary has considered the Kahn resolution calling for the attorney general to submit data bearing on the McNab resignation. Chairman Clayton said he expected the committee to make a favorable report. The administration, he said, is not opposing submission of the papers. Kahn probably will be the only witness examined by the committee.

When the house judiciary met to consider the Kahn resolution calling on McReynolds to submit data on the resignation of McNab there was no quorum, and action was postponed until tomorrow. It is denied any remained away purposely. Kahn denounced McReynolds and praised McNab and said Wilson's explanation was not satisfactory.

Asserting Anthony Caminetti was unfit to act as commissioner general of immigration to assume charge of government's work in running down white slavers among aliens, because of connection with the McNab-McReynolds controversy, Congressman Mann, minority leader of the house, demanded a separate investigation of the whole affair.

Kahn has consented to amend the resolution "if compatible to public interest" to avoid publication of the basis of the government demand for conviction of the white slave and fuel for the controversy. Webb of North Carolina, who declared McNab was a candidate for governor, "playing politics, rushing into print to secure cheap notoriety."

Thomas of Kentucky interrupted to say, judging from newspaper reports there are more graft and corruption in California than any other state.

Kahn shouted: "People of California are as good as Kentucky, but are determined to unmask graft and corruption. In some states they are covered up."

McReynolds was not represented at the hearing.

Warrants are Issued. Sacramento, June 26.—Deputy sheriffs are seeking Drew Caminetti, who yesterday was indicted by the grand jury for abandonment of minor children when he eloped to Reno with Maury Diggs, Marshall Warrington and Lola Norris.

Bench warrants for Caminetti and Diggs were issued and Diggs is said to be at Berkeley.

Caminetti is at Sacramento but not located at noon.

"We will prosecute the pair in local courts," said District Attorney Wachurst. "We will consult McNab and be pleased if he could be secured to aid in the prosecution."

Mrs. Caminetti Suffers. Jackson, June 26.—"McNab would not be a true American to do otherwise than what has been done." This declaration of Mrs. Elisabeth Caminetti, wife of Drew, who is living in seclusion with two children as the result of the escapade of her husband, "want to see the men punished as they deserve. I believe that will be the outcome. But the children, they are the ones to suffer."

TARIFF AND CURRENCY IS CAUCUS THEME

LEADING DEMOCRATS BOUND TO SUPPORT ADMINISTRATION MEASURE.

CURRENCY CHANGES MADE

Caucus to Take Up Many Important Matters This Week Pertaining to the Tariff—Child Labor Products From Abroad May Be Excluded, as Matter is Under Consideration Today.

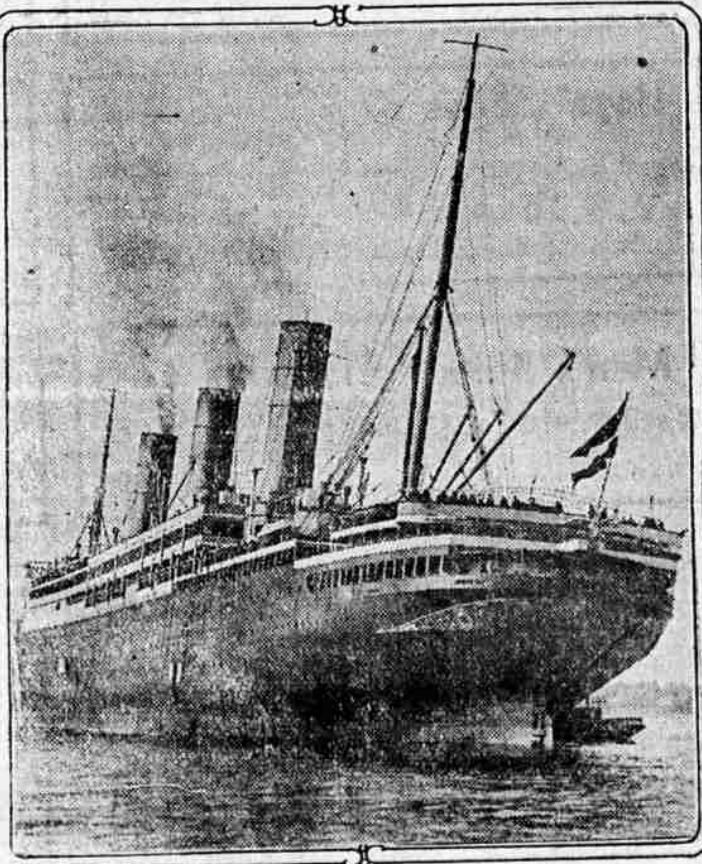
Washington, June 26.—Rapid progress is expected to be made by the democratic senate caucus considering the tariff bill. It is probable that a resolution binding members except two Louisiana men, opposed to free sugar, to support the bill will be finally adopted by the caucus. The caucus took up the countervailing duties on wheat and specific duties on silk. The provision to exclude products of child and convict labor in foreign countries was also considered. The income tax section will be considered Friday and Saturday.

The president and advisers have decided to reinsert the currency bill clause providing for retirement of the present issue of \$700,000,000 National Bank Notes, secured by two per cent bonds, and give the new federal reserve board the right to reissue the retired currency by the refund scheme on three per cent. The present issue will be gradually retired through the twenty years to come.

Auto Accident Fatal. Chicago, June 26.—H. A. Gregory and Miss Minnie Bristol were killed when their auto crashed into the bridge railing over a lagoon at Lima Park. The body of the girl was recovered from the lagoon.

Heat Prostrations Many. Chicago, June 26.—Two deaths and a score of prostrations from heat is reported. The temperature touched eighty-seven with great humidity.

IMPERATOR, GREATEST OF LINERS, ARRIVES.



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Crawling slowly up the Ambrose Channel on her maiden voyage, the Emperor, largest steamship afloat, received her first salute on American shores from a special tug off Fort Wadsworth. The big vessel vigorously returned the salute. Other vessels then shrieked a welcome and hundreds of persons on the shores took up the cry.

The Emperor's length is 919 feet, beam 98 feet, height of bridge above water 90 feet, gross tonnage 50,000. She is commanded by five captains. Her chief commander is Hans Ruser. She has three wireless operators, and the apparatus is so strong that it is never out of touch of land of one side of the ocean or the other. She has nine decks and six elevators which are kept constantly busy. Her life boats accommodate 4,000 persons. It has a complete telephone system, and an imperial suit of twelve rooms. She has a garden growing flowers and shrubbery, and a theatre and ballroom. She carries a crew of 1180 and made her first trip in six days, five hours and fourteen minutes.

CHARTER STUDY IS PROVIDED

Arguments For and Against Commission Form Can Be Attached To Printed Form

Every registered voter in the city of La Grande is to have a printed copy of the proposed commission-manager form of government charter. The judiciary committee of the council last evening reported out the charter after a week's deliberations on the question, the document having gone to that committee at the time it was presented to the council by a citizens' committee with sufficient signatures to give it initiative powers. Councilmen Sargent, Davis and Fitzgerald comprise this committee neither supported or opposed the document.

The committee recommended; and their report was adopted, that the charter be printed and mailed to each registered voter in the city for careful study. The natural course of the events will be taken, meaning that in 90 days an election will be called by the city recorder. The committee believed, and the councilmen in general coincided that plenty of time should be given the matter for careful consideration.

REGULAR CAR SERVICE SURE

TWENTY-FIVE CENTS FOR THE ROUND TRIP.

Well Cushioned Auto Truck to Run Every 15 Minutes to Park.

Schedule trips between two stations in the city to the park during chautauqua week, which commences next Monday, have been provided for by the transportation committee of the chautauqua. A large auto truck, comfortably rigged with cushioned seats, will run regularly on schedule hours, and it is contemplated to have several automobiles that will help in rush hours on a 25 cents for round trip basis. That is the schedule price of the auto truck and it is probable several other automobiles will run at the same price during rush hours, especially.

The truck will leave the central station in front of the People's store at 9 o'clock a. m. and return leaving the park at 11:45. In the afternoon the car will run on 15-minute schedules commencing at one o'clock and continuing until 2:30, making stops at the central station and at the A. G. Geddes store regularly.

Between 5 and 6 p. m. the car will leave the park grounds every 15 minutes, making it possible for people to return after the program and for businessmen to join their families at the park for dinner.

Commencing at about 7 o'clock, the car will run regularly until the program starts, and then at 9:30 will leave the park gate every 15 minutes until those who desire to ride have been cared for.

MOTORCYCLISTS COLLIDE.

William Adair and Harley Richardson Have Narrow Escape.

Two motorcycles are in the repair shop for extensive going over and William Adair and Harley Richardson the owners, are slightly bruised up, and Miss Alice Hill fortunately escaped all injury as the result of a collision between two motorcycles at the foot of Sixth street hill yesterday. Mr. Adair was coasting down the hill when his chain broke and when just in front of the F. D. Haisten residence, stopped suddenly for want of power, and turned slightly to the left just in time to catch Mr. Richardson and Miss Hill, who were coasting down the hill behind Mr. Adair. Because the machines were running slowly, no further damage was done except that suffered by the machines.

MORE BIG BERRIES.

What Is Now Record Is Attained by M. M. Marquis of May Park.

COUNCIL HAS NOISY DEBATE AND ARGUMENT

TYPEWRITER AND SEWER THE CAUSE OF MUCH ARGUMENT AND LOUD TALK.

MANY MATTERS HANDLED

Having Project Up In Sewer. Plans First Steps Taken to Freshets and Regulate Streams In West and

Overheated debate, hurling of accusations and defenses, personal exchanges of insinuations and near-insults punctuated with lifting of clinched fists were some of the sensational features of an adjourned session of the city council last night. The city sewer suit and the new famous typewriter sale were the two topics prompting the heated climax to a dreary evening of routine business. City Attorney Rusk, Councilman W. B. Sargent, Councilman F. D. Haisten and Mayor M. K. Hall, with other councilmen taking minor parts, played the principal roles in the realistic and exciting drama. The first and severest battle of words that same near leading to worse than words, came when Councilman Sargent urged prompt settlement of the jury awards to J. H. Pearce for damages in building the sewer pipe in front of a five-acre tract of the city. When asked by the mayor to give his candid opinion on the matter from the standpoint of a councilman, Mr. Sargent expressed the belief the payment should be made. City Attorney Rusk got the floor with difficulty and proceeded to express his opinions on the verdict in general and against Mr. Sargent in particular. He said he was not ready to say as to whether payment should be made or an appeal taken, but at the conclusion of the flinging of accusations and charges, the city attorney was instructed to give serious thought to the question and report at the next meeting. In response to the objection from the city attorney against a councilman acting in the dual capacity of attorney in a case against the city and a councilman at the same time, Mr. Sargent voiced the defense that he was representing the people's rights by defending their property rights and therefore, representing the people he was elected to represent. Mr. Sargent said however he would not vote on the issue when a vote was taken, but to escape a vote he must have unanimous consent of the council members. Mayor Hall pounded with his gavel until he got order out of chaos and discussion of the question went on in a more orderly manner toward the last.

Typewriter at Issue Again. Several minutes of animated and vitriolic debate were precipitated by Councilman Haisten when he objected to installing a \$13 fountain at the park out of funds other than those accrued through the park tax. Mayor Hall started it by remarking about "four fountains would buy one typewriter."

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BLIGHT EXPERTS WILL COME TO LA GRANDE ON JULY 2ND

Relief for orchardmen who have been visited by a serious blight that is doing great damage to orchards this year, is promised in the arrival of several blight experts in La Grande July 2. They will deliver lectures at the chautauqua grounds and probably give public demonstrations in a nearby orchard as to how to fight the blight. The blight question is creating a great deal of worry to orchardmen this summer and the chautauqua has provided for it through the Oregon Horticultural society, several men who will give to Grande Ronde the best methods to fight the pest. The problem is new here and these men will bring the word that local orchardmen want to hear. They are headed by Prof. H. S. Jackson, who will talk on pear blight and is one of the best versed men on this topic in the state. Others will take different subjects, and bring a message here that will be appreciated. Every orchardist in the valley will profit by this lecture. H. B. Miller, H. M. Williamson and Frank W. Power are among the other visitors who will come that date to the chautauqua to talk to the orchardmen. C. L. Smith and M. M. McCool, the former the O.-W. agricultural and the latter of O. A. C. will add to the list of men who will lecture that day.
