WILLAMETTE CHERRIES HURT

RAIN HAS DONE GREAT DAMAGE THERE.

Local Cherries However, Escape Serious Damages From Rain.

Cherries Here Hurt Little. Lack of maturing weather has saved Grande Ronde cherries during the prolonged rains and there has been little or no damage done other than to delay maturity. Home grown, early varieties, are selling for 10 cents per pound, and Milton Royal Anns, 15 cents a pound.

Portland, June 26.—Many tons of cherries are rotting and cracking in the Willamette valley on account of the local continued rains. This information was brought to the city today by Joseph Nibbler, a prominent producer of Woodburn, who was a business visitor today in company with C. Christensen, a grower of the same place.

According to Mr. Nibbler, the damage to the cherry crop of his section is unusually severe. The rains not only did considerable damage to cherries, but a very large proportion of the strawberry crop was ruined by the constant downpour of recent weeks.
