Portland Conference Interests.
Portland, July 1.—Most of the time at the World's Conference today was taken up by sectional conferences on the family, peace, capital and labor. Four recommendations tending toward a change in the attitude of humanity toward war were made by a special commission on peace today. There will be a number of addresses this afternoon in the stadium.

Rebels Ignore Foreign Flags.
Mexico City, July 1.—Dispatches from Durango say that forty women were captured in that city last week and committed suicide to escape from the indignities to which they were subjected by the rebel troops. It is reported that the rebels ignored all foreign flags. One Englishman was killed and several Americans wounded.

More Officials Suspended.
San Francisco, July 1.—The suspension of four more police officers who are charged by bunco men with receiving hush money, was announced today by the police commissioner.
