In eight months last winter he was idle 21 evenings including Sundays; the balance of the time he was on the speaker's platform and E. H. Griggs alone has more lecture dates than Mr. Baumgardt.

"The slides that come at the close of my lecture tonight are the very latest things from the heavens and are marvelous in the photographic line. I shall show these pictures and bring a message about the stars that every layman can understand," said the savant today. He has 56 lectures covering science, travel, men of prominence in the world's history and other related subjects, and two of these will be given here with prologues. "See America first."

Mr. Baumgardt is himself a scientist of note, and is ex-president of the Southern California Academy of Sciences. His entire series of lectures comprise something like one hundred in number, all of which bear

directly upon art, travel, science and the history of human civilization. A list of the colleges and schools at which Mr. Baumgardt has lectured would be voluminous indeed, and it would not be confined to America alone, for Mr. Baumgardt is abroad a part of every year.

"Astronomy Speech Fine. "An Evening With the Stars," is one feature lecture.

No pains have been spared to make this lecture an intellectual and artistic treat. The stereopticon views are from celestial negatives obtained principally at the Yerkes and Lick observatories by world renowned astronomers.

In this lecture are shown the most wonderful pictures of the moon and of all of the planets in their respective orders and distances from the sun. The strange satellite systems of Jupiter and Saturn are dealt with in detail. Comets, double, triple and quadruple stars, mysterious and fantastic nebulae, those chaotic, primordial beginnings of other solar systems, clusters and congeries of stars situated on the very confines of the creation, make this a scientific masterpiece. At one time no less than one hundred and fifty thousand stars are shown upon the screen, all suns which in all probability, are surrounded with retinues of planets and satellites similar to our own.

"The Fjords of Norway, Majestic Land of the Midnight Sun," is his lecture tomorrow night.

His lecture on Norway is founded on intimate acquaintance with the land and its interesting people. He speaks the language and visits the country annually. The lecture is intended to give a thorough understanding of Norway and the Norwegians; the dramas of Ibsen and the poetry of Bjornson; the music of Greig, Kjerulf and Sinding; the influence of environment upon a people who have lived in isolation for fifteen hundred years; the life of the fishing-folk of the Lofoten Islands; the harnessing of the sublime waterfalls, without marring their beauty; the Gothenburg system for controlling the liquor traffic; the Lapps and their strange customs; the status of Norwegian women and the results of emigration upon a sparsely populated and extremely poor land.

This most interesting series of views showing some of the most remarkable American scenery will be shown if desired, as a prologue. Included are views of the Yellowstone National park, the Yosemite, the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, and California.

war lord. M. ...'s famous song of 1878 fits the case exactly:

"We don't want to fight, but, by Jingo! if we do,"

"We've got the ships, we've got the men, we've got the money, too."

There may be other men in Germany who see as clearly as William II what a calamity an European war would be, but these others are not men who feel themselves divinely called to rule over the destinies of a people and answerable before the judgment seat for their conduct. William does feel himself thus called. Not much has been heard of the divine right of kings since the famous Konigsberg speech of three or four years ago, but there is no reason to believe that the kaiser has changed his attitude, or that he considers himself in any other light than as a ruler divinely sent to guide his people and bound to render an account of his stewardship at the last great day.

There is need in Germany today of clear-headed statesmanship tempered with a feeling of responsibility. The empire is not well off in the matter of statesmen. In fact, the kaiser is Germany's only real statesman today. The truth might as well be admitted, for nobody who has followed recent events is ignorant of the situation. It is not so long since the chancellor stood up in the Reichstag and told the members that the peril of Slav domination menaced the nation. It was not so long before that that there was a recrudescence of anglophobia in the land. Russia and Great Britain—these were the two enemies of the future, the implacable opponents and evil wishers of the empire. The czar of Russia and the king of Great Britain have just returned home after a visit in Berlin, which, so far as one outside the charmed circle of royalty could judge, was one of unusual cordiality and was marked by an apparently genuine and amiable exchange of courtesies between the kaiser and his two reputed enemies.
