

TURKS READS TO PROFIT BY BALKAN STRIFE

FINDS EXCUSE TO TAKE HAND IN INTERECENE FIGHTING NOW GOING ON.

BULGARS SUFFER HEAVILY

Balkan States In Uproar and While In That State Turkey May Take Some of Territory Lost In Unsuccessful Fight Some Months Ago—Heavy Losses Reported In All Battles.

Vienna, July 3.—Servia has formally declared war on Bulgaria tonight according to a dispatch from Uskub. The Servian army headquarters are at Uskub. King Peter is there.

Greeks Are Aiding Servians. Athens, July 3.—Official advices from the front declare that the Greeks are aiding the Servians to continue their advance by inflicting heavy losses on the Bulgarians, by capturing several important positions. The dispatches say that the Greek losses are considerable.

Turkey May Take a Hand.

Constantinople, July 3.—Danger of Turkey taking a hand in the Balkan struggle between Greece, Servia and Bulgaria became imminent when the Sultan notified the powers that despite the preliminary peace agreement which has already been signed, Turkey reserves the right to fight if the war spreads over Macedonia. The impression is that Turkey if she finds her former Balkan allies weakened by the internecine strife, will summon forces and strike to retake and hold some of the European territory won by the Balkans.

Heavy Fighting Continues.

Belgrade, Servia, July 3.—After two days of stubborn fighting the Bulgarian forces are retreating before the Servians according to official dispatches. The dispatches stated that the Servians were uniformly successful in various engagements and yesterday captured 1200 Bulgars after a battle in which the losses were heavy on both sides.

Roumania to Stand by Bulgaria.

Bucharest, July 3.—King Charles today ordered general mobilization of the Roumanian army. It is believed certain that Roumania has decided to fight beside Servia and Greece in the hope of grasping a part of the territory taken from Turkey by the Bulgarians.

CONVICT AT SALEM FLEES.

Breaks Away From Guards Near Tuberculosis Institute; Gets Away.

Salem, Or., July 3.—Guards of the penitentiary are searching the surrounding country today for Homer Lester, a convict, who escaped from the road gang near the Tuberculosis Institute this forenoon. Lester was working under guard and escaped by breaking from the gang and running into some brush. He was committed from Malheur County and was serving from one to five years for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Woman Beat Former Record.

Astoria, July 3.—The speedboat Sylph, arrived here at eight o'clock after bettering by twenty-nine minutes and thirty seconds, the record made by the same boat and established last year for the hundred mile run down the Columbia from Portland. Mrs. George Kendall, wife of the owner, drove the boat the entire distance.

CONGRESS TO EMPLOY AGENT IN INQUIRIES

WELL KNOWN PROSECUTOR TO BE EMPOWERED TO AID IN MULHALL CASE.

TEN THOUSAND SET ASIDE

Sweeping Resolution to Be Introduced Saturday Calling for Complete Investigation of Mulhall Charges Corruption In Lobby Departments—May Prosecute Lamar In New York.

Washington, July 3.—Twenty thousand letters, telegrams and other reports have been waded through by the insidious probers in connections with the lobby charges of Martin Mulhall. Mulhall's latest revelations refer to the alleged activity of officials of the Manufacturers' association in the campaign of former Representative James Watson for the governorship of Indiana, in 1908.

Henry B. Martin, secretary of the national anti-trust league admitted to the investigating committee today he and David Lamar who testified yesterday, they were authors of the original resolution authorizing the Stanley steel trust probe, declaring Lamar's decision passed "substantially as it was drawn". Martin characterized Lamar as a public spirited citizen and a bitter foe to the railroad trust. The suggestion is being made that Samuel Uttermeyer be employed as special counsel to assist the house Mulhall probers. They probably will ask the senate to concur in a ten thousand appropriation to provide funds for the house probe.

Members of the senate committee admit they cannot punish Lamar for impersonations as various public men but propose to ask the New York prosecutors to act. Members of the house rules committee began drafting a

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Old Soldiers Stabbed In Riot Started When Man In Gray Slurs Lincoln

Gettysburg, Pa., July 3.—Governors of many states today participated in the second day's program of the great Blue and Gray reunion on the field of Gettysburg. Governor John K. Tener, of Pennsylvania, acted as host to the visiting chief executives at a formal reception. Later in the day he was master of ceremonies when addresses were delivered by many prominent veterans and civilians.

Gettysburg, July 3.—About a third of the veterans are en route home but most of the others are awaiting the coming of President Wilson tomorrow. This is the first time in history that a southern born president has visited the battlefield. The reception will be enthusiastic. Today is governors' day, 14 executives being present. Governors Sulzer of New York and Cox

of Ohio are among the principal speakers.

Seven Stabbed in Row

An old veteran who was sitting at a table in the dining room of the Gettysburg hotel, last night, hearing some slighting remarks about Lincoln jumped to his feet and began to berate the slanders, defending Lincoln's name. The men who were stabbed according to witnesses, jumped in to help the veteran, knives were drawn and the room thrown into an uproar. It was all over before the others in the room could get their breath and the principals of the tragedy had left. The seven men were rushed to hospitals.

Their condition is reported as serious.

D. P. Henry, claiming to be a son of Brigadier General Henry, of Virginia, is held as one of the two men who stabbed seven others last night during the fight which started when sev-

en were aroused to anger by an in gray criticizing Lincoln. Henry denies the allegation.

One hundred confederate veterans, survivors of Pickett's brigade, gathered at two this afternoon at Emmetsburg road about a quarter of a mile from the stone wall about which fifty years to the hour, the fiercest conflict of modern warfare was waged. Behind the stone wall were 100 survivors of the Pennsylvania division of the Grand Army, who stopped Pickett's charge. Each group carried tattered battleflags they had borne fifty years ago. At a sharp command the confederates advanced at double quick time and met the Union soldiers at the stone wall all stopped and shook hands.

The veterans inaugurated plans for a national monument to be erected at the spot.

GUN USED IN QUARREL OVER A DEAD CANINE

PETE BEATTIE AND PERRY BERGE COME TO TROUBLE AT ISLAND CITY.

BERGE WOUNDED IN ARM

Quarrel Three Months Old Results In Shooting Affair at Island City—Two Men Forced to Aid In Chase—Both Men Arrested and Are to Be Arraigned today—Both Local Men.

Perry Berge, a local man of twenty odd years carries wounds of two bullets, one in his arm and another on the shoulder, both lacking serious nature, and is in the toils of the law today and Pete Beattie is likewise arrested as the climax of a quarrel commenced by the shooting of a dog on the Walter Pierce ranch some three months ago. Two men uninterested in the case were forcibly used in a chase subsequent to the shooting that took place at Island City yesterday afternoon about 3:30. The two principals in the gun play were arrested yesterday evening by Chief of Police McLachlin and Deputy Sheriff Rees.

The origination of the trouble seems to rest upon the shooting of a dog belonging to Berge. He was employed on the Fred Gaskill ranch and his dog strayed over to the Pierce ranch it is said, and was there shot by Beattie according to report. Some time later Beattie and Berge got into a fight in La Grande, were arrested and fined. No further outbreak occurred it is said until yesterday evening when Beattie, now working for Kirk Wills drove to Island City after a load of gravel, had stopped the team in the streets of the city when Berge is said to have approached him and uttered words that Beattie deemed to be threats. The story goes that Beattie made no verbal reply but pulled a revolver and shot twice, hitting Berge once in the arm and grazing the shoulder once.

At the conclusion of the fusillade of bullets, Beattie drove on, and after a few minutes Berge met Dwight Barnes of Elgin, in an automobile and with a rifle to give his words impression ordered Barnes to take Berge aboard and give chase to Beattie. This was done but at the Shafer ranch Ed Halley was overtaken, and Berge is said to have ordered Halley to take him with him leaving Barnes free. At the 7th brick place, Beattie was overtaken but had gone to a nearby farmhouse and seeing this, Berge had Halley turn around and on reaching Moss Chapel on the return, John Vandermullen was enlisted to take Berge to La Grande, he bleeding somewhat freely. Dr. Fall dressed the wounds and shortly after Berge was placed under arrest and Beattie was later apprehended by the officers named. They were placed in the county jail and today the matter of preliminary hearing was taken up.

Both men are well known locally and are less than 30 years of age.

Ice Fight Progresses.

Cincinnati, July 3.—Nine ice plants under municipal supervision started manufacturing ice for residents today. The plants were seized because no hope of a settlement in the industrial differences of the ice manufacturers and their employees is in sight. The manufacturers are expected to apply injunctions this afternoon.

TRAIN SAVED FROM DISASTER

TRAIN WRECKERS FAIL IN WRECKING SCHEME.

Angle Irons and Switch Points Fail to Derail Passenger.

Seattle, July 3.—Special agents and a sheriff's posse are endeavoring to locate the train wreckers who tried to ditch a Northern Pacific passenger near Auburn last night by piling angle irons and switch points on the rails. The only thing that prevented possible great loss of life was that the pilot of the engine lifted the switch point clear of the track and the engine, going 40 miles an hour, bumped over the angle irons without leaving the rails.

JESSIE WILSON SOON A BRIDE

ENGAGEMENT ANNOUNCED AT WASHINGTON.

Wealthy New York Attorney, Friend of Roosevelt, Is Groom.

New York, July 3.—Francis Bowie Sayre, the young attorney, who is to wed Jessie Wilson, daughter of the president, is wealthy in his own right. The engagement was announced at Washington last night. Sayre is working as district attorney in Whitman's office without pay. It is said Colonel Roosevelt introduced him to Whitman. When asked whether he was a member of the "bull moose" party Sayre said he greatly admired the Colonel, but voted for Wilson. Sayre met Jessie at Lancaster, Pa., in 1911.

It was unofficially announced today that the marriage of Jessie Wilson to Francis Bowers Sayre would take place about the middle of August. The exact date has not been set. The simple ceremony will take place in the east room.

Tumulty Has Sense of Humor.

Washington, July 3.—"Joe" Tumulty, secretary to the president, has an Irish sense of humor, and is rapidly getting a reputation as one of the best of spoofers. On one of the president's recent visits to the capitol, while he was conferring with senators, "Joe" stood chatting with a number of correspondents outside the door. One of them, a rotund person observed that "Joe" was losing weight. Tumulty nodded seriously. "Yes," he said, "I'm dieting, and I'm losing two pounds a day." "How do you do it, Slip me the receipt," pleaded the reporter. "Well," said Tumulty, with portentous gravity. "In the morning I take a little orange juice and a cup of coffee. I used to eat a steak and some eggs and drink a couple of cups of coffee. For lunch I take a little soup and maybe some asparagus or some other vegetable. That's all. For dinner I take a very light meal—a truffle or so."

The reporter scowled. "But soup's are fattening," he objected. "Well try my scheme anyhow," the secretary urged as he hurried away. The same afternoon the reporter dropped into the Willard Hotel. At the World's Conference.

Portland, July 3.—"The family, marriage and divorce," was the big topic under discussion today at the fifth day's session of the Second World's Christian Citizenship conference which will continue through July 6. This afternoon the delegates turned their attention to matters of prison reform, social purity, intemperance and capital and its relation to labor. The meetings were held in the huge open-air amphitheatre of the Multnomah Athletic club. Delegates numbering approximately 20,000 are in attendance from all parts of the United States and from several European countries.
