Section 2 of Ordinance No 25, Series 1892.

That any person or persons who shall fire off or discharge any ord- nance, gun, pistol, rifle or other fire arms within the corporate limits of the City of La Grande, Ore. or any squit, rocket, roman candle, chaser, fire- cracker, torpedo, or other fireworks of any kind or nature whatsoever, shall upon conviction thereof before the recorder be punished by a fine of not less than (\$5) dollars, nor more than fifty (50) dollars or by imprisonment in the City Jail not less than two and one half days, nor more than twenty- five (25) days. This ordinance will be strictly enforced.

ENGINE SHIPMENT ARRIVES.

La Grande to Be Distributing Point for All Eastern Oregon.

A complete car of Grey gasoline en- gines, ranging from nine horse-power down, arrived yesterday and will be distributed to all eastern Oregon coun- ties going as far as Bend and Burns. W. H. Bonenkamp & Company are the wholesalers but to the immediate ter- ritory will retail as well, having placed agencies in practically every Eastern Oregon county. The engines are shipped to this point and then re-shipped to agencies later on. Chas Bonen- kamp has recently returned from an extended tour through Eastern Oregon where he placed many such agencies.

McGraw is Suspended.

New York, July 3.—Manager Mc- Graw of the New York Giants, and Pitcher Prennan of the Philadelphia Nationals were each suspended five days by president Lynch of the Na- tional League as a result of their re- cent fight at Philadelphia. Brennan was also fined one hundred dollars.

CRANE CASE IS UPHOLD

LONG-LIVED LITIGATION ENDS IN HIGH COURT.

Supreme Court Upholds Lower Court's Action in the Case.

Many cases of local importance have been decided by the supreme court this week, and Judge Knowles has like- wise acted in several cases of local interest. The famous Crane vs. O-W. case came out of the supreme court this week and settles litigation that has been going on for several years over the right of the O-W. to run sidetracks by and over property claim- ed by, and some owned by, Mrs. Susan Crane, whose property is at the inter- section of North Second by the main line of the railroad road. Judge Knowles some time ago held that in the ejectment suit brought by Mrs. Crane and to their heirs she was en- titled to damage money, and instruct- ed the jury to find that a portion of the ground involved had been validly set aside for street purposes and there- fore validly used by the railroad for track purposes, but also ruled that a portion of the tracks were on land owned by Mrs. Crane. Mrs. Crane ap- pealed the case, and then the railroad company began condemnation pro- ceedings which are now finished and condemnation money paid Mrs. Crane. The supreme court held this week that the local court decided the matter ac- cording to the law.

Other cases acted further upon by the supreme court, in which a deci- sion was recently handed down, are:

Walk vs. Hibberd, where the lower court jury decision was reversed, and the Wade vs. Amalgamated Sugar Co. in Wallowa in which the lower court was reversed—motion for rehearing having been subsequently filed and these motions were this week denied without opinion.

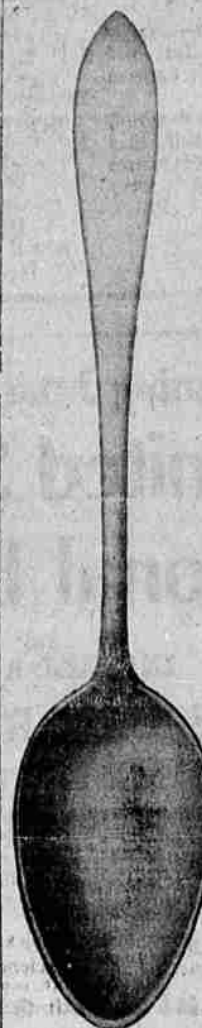
