several valuable horses through peculiar mediums. An examination of conditions leads the doctor to think the animals, eight of them died from eating rank vegetation brought on by the excessive rains.

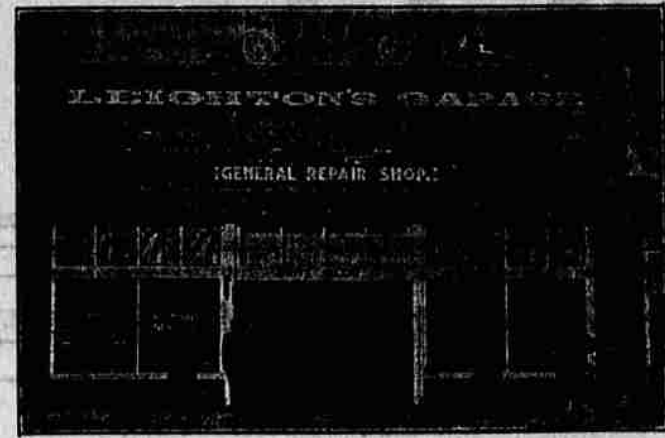
Pendleton Talks Commission.

Sentiment among a majority of business and professional men interviewed today is unanimously in favor of a commission government for the city of Pendleton. Each expressed the opinion that such a form is the only method of managing the affairs of a municipality. It was agreed that if an amendment is submitted to the city charter, say in October, it would carry by a large plurality.

One of the men, Judge J. A. Fee, did not care to be quoted and gave no intimation which way his sentiments were inclined. Another, Harry Gray, a prominent business man, was satisfied with the present system but was not adverse to the commission form, being willing to admit that there are many excellent features in that method of government. These were the only two men interviewed today who did not become enthusiastic over the plan to submit the commission question to a vote of the people.

Somewhat cautiously, Mayor Matlock expressed the opinion that while to his mind the commission form is the only method, he had some doubt if the right men could be found to handle the business of the city. He said that for Pendleton, a commission of three would be sufficient. Then there would be the question of the particular form of commission whether a form like Baker has in vogue, or one fashioned after the Portland system. He said that he thought this question should be definitely settled before the matter was brought to the attention of the voters. Judge Stephen A. Lowell was strongly agreeable to boost for the commission system. He declared it is the only system for any city. He said: "I am in favor of voting again on the commission government amendment to the city charter and favor a vote separate and distinct from the troublesome incidents of a general municipal election. The matter should go to the people alone, and that as early as possible. In my judgment the old form of government is shifed and the new ideas are working better the longer they are used. Personally I shall support the amendment with voice and vote."

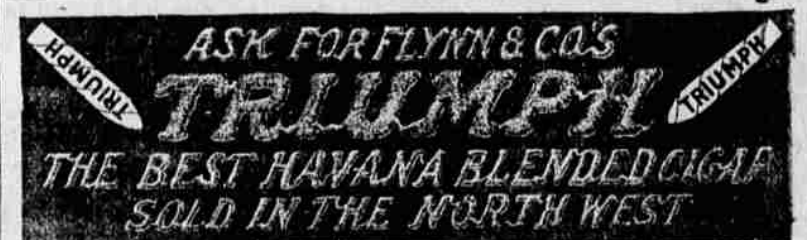
