dependency and delinquency of children; distribution and assimilation of immigrants; the relation of commercial organizations to social welfare; the relation of health to productive power; the probation and paroling of prisoners; the care of feeble minded children, the church and social work and the standards of living and labor.

Other questions which will be taken up in sectional conferences are minimum wage legislation, accident indemnity, indemnity for trade diseases, old age insurance, old age pensions and employment insurance. Another section of the conference will discuss the honor system in vogue in various penal institutions throughout the country and also the care of discharged prisoners.

In this connection Governor Oswald West of Oregon will deliver an address in which he will point out the success which has attended the adoption of the parole system in the Oregon state penitentiary.

Among the prominent eastern social and charity workers in attendance and who will participate in discussion are: Henry T. Noyes, Jr., chamber of commerce, Rochester, N. Y.; E. M. Williams, chamber of commerce, Cleveland, Ohio; Francis H. McLean, general secretary American Association of Societies for Organizing Charities; Miss Florence Kelly, National Consumers League; Dr. Anna Louise Strong, New York, director National Child Welfare Exhibition Committee; L. A. Halbert, member Kansas City Board of Public Welfare; Mrs. Margaret Byington, associate director of charity organization society, Russell Sage Foundation; Alexander Johnson, director extension department training school, Vineland, N. J.; Dr. Mary O'Brien Porter, Protectorate Catholic Women's League, Chicago; F. J. Sessions, superintendent of the Soldiers' and Orphans' Institute, Davenport, Ia.; Stanley J. Howe, secretary public charities association, Pennsylvania. Tomorrow the conference sermon will be preached by Dr. A. J. McKelway, of Washington, D. C.

Frank Tucker of New York City is president of the National Conference of Charities and Correction and Alexander Johnson is secretary.

On account of the magnitude of the conference it was necessary to engage the Moore, Metropolitan and the Grand Theatres, besides several of the churches and civic buildings. The conference will consist of eleven gen-

eral sessions and nine sectional meetings.

The National Conference of Charities and Correction is the parent body of practically all of the national associations dealing with social and sanitary reform. Many of the policies enunciated in the platforms of recent political conventions have been the result of the deliberations of these conferences, among them being the prevention of industrial accidents, occupational diseases, child labor, minimum wage, the adoption of the eight hour day, application of prisoners' wages to dependent families, vocational training, compensation for industrialist accident and trade diseases and social insurance.
