### Big Carnival Ends.

Chicago, July 5.—The last competitive events of the big athletic carnival at Grant Park stadium, the National Amateur Athletic union championships, started this afternoon before the largest crowd that has attended the games during the week. In several events two or more Olympic stars were matched and some sensational performances were looked for.

The final heat of the 110 meter high hurdles at Stockholm, Sweden, was to be re-enacted this afternoon. Fred Kelly, star of the University of Southern California, was the favorite. Three other American hurdlers who pushed him to his remarkable performance at Stockholm, were his competitors again this afternoon.

J. P. Nicholson, captain of the University of Missouri track team; John R. Case, University of Illinois, and E. J. Wendell, Wesleyan University, were the three who were expected to make Kelly extend himself to the very limit to capture the event.

The Olympic games last year so overshadowed the national A. A. U. championships in this country, that the lists were not well filled. This year, however, there were entered practically every athlete of renown and near-renown in America. It was confidently expected that with weather conditions favorable, there would be some new records hung up. The nine days' meet comes to an end tomorrow when German turners stage competitive drills.

### Gruesome Charge Preferred.

Capestrano, Italy, July 5.—Maroni Ascenzio, recently returned to his native town from New York, is under arrest today charged with burning his wife alive. Following the receipt of anonymous letters at New York telling him that his wife was unfaithful to him during his absence Ascenzio returned to his home here immediately.

He is declared to have greeted his wife the first day of his return with every show of affection. The second day, the couple went for a walk in the woods. This was the last ever seen of the woman. A priest, however, who was passing through the timber at the time heard piercing shrieks from a

distance. He made his way towards them and found a fierce fire blazing about a tree. Supposing it to be only the work of urchins, however, he passed on. The day following when the disappearance of Mrs. Ascenzio became known, the priest led a number of citizens to the burnt tree. The woman's finger ring and gold earrings were found in the ashes. Ascenzio was arrested just as he reached Chiasso, on the Italian-Swiss border, presumably making his way back to New York.

### King Reviews Troops.

London, July 5.—King George today reviewed the London Territorials (Militia) in Hyde Park and hundreds of thousands turned out to cheer the citizen soldiers. The parade, which mustered more than 20,000 strong, included two divisions, with two brigades of field artillery, 28 battalions of infantry, three regiments of cavalry and engineer, transport and medical corps. Major General E. C. Bethune, director general of the territorial forces, was in command assisted by Major General Sir Alfred Cochrington. The King who wore undress uniform of a field marshal was accompanied by the Duke of Connaught, Prince Arthur, War Minister Col. J. E. B. Seeley, Lord Chancellor Viscount Haldane, First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill and a distinguished staff of officers. Queen Mary and Princess Mary watched the procession from the royal carriage.

### Half Holiday Rule On.

Washington, July 5.—The 100,000 more or less, hired hands of Uncle Sam, today enjoyed their first Saturday half holiday of the summer. The half holiday program for the government department employees is discretionary with the President and cabinet heads. This year, as usual it will be in operation through the months of July, August and September. President Wilson is a firm believer in the Saturday half holiday plan, and ever since assuming office has taken a rest on the sixth day.

### Mann Starts Fillbuster.

Washington, July 5.—Asserting that the democrats are trying to prevent the discussion of the Diggs-Caminetti incident and the resignation of former district attorney McNab, Republican Floor Leader Mann threatened in the house today to prevent transaction of any other business by filibustering until he and other republicans are permitted to discuss the Caminetti matter on the floor of the house.

### Intemperance, Conference Theme.

Portland, July 5.—The sectional conference of the World's Christian Citizenship conference today discussed "Intemperance". The report of the committee stated 70 per cent of the territory in the United States was free of saloons and fifty per cent of the population lived in sections where there are no saloons. A campaign for a constitutional amendment established to national prohibition was inaugurated.

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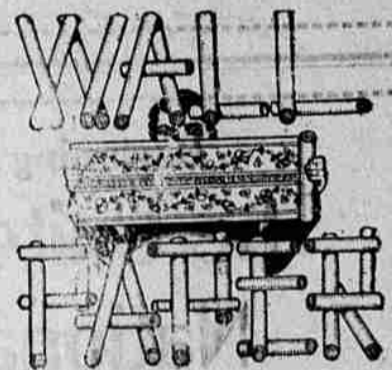
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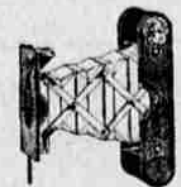
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
