### School Biology a Farce.

Eugene, Or., July 7.—(Special)—"Biological science, as taught in the high schools today, is a sad and stupid failure," said Prof. C. S. Hodge, of Clark University, one of the leading authorities on biology in the United States, who was the speaker of the day before the University of Oregon summer school this morning. "The silly little courses in botany and zoology, generally speaking, mean nothing and lead to nothing. In many schools the expensive equipment of microscopes, etc., is gathering dust in the discard, and the work is regarded with discouragement.

"All this is because of a mistaken effort to give to high school students a kind of training that is fitted only for those of college grades. I maintain that biology must be taught this way: In the grade schools, Nature Study or the biology of the house, the garden and the barnyard; in the high school, civic biology, or the biology affecting the life of the community; and in the university, dynamo

## GOD OF THE BIBLE VS. GOD OF CREEDS

### Great Idols of Christendom More Heinous Than Idols of Heathendom, Says Pastor Russell.

The Bible Opposed to All Idols—God Must Be Known to Be Appreciated and Truly Worshiped—Misunderstandings of the Divine Plan Have Confused Us—Ignorance the Mother of Superstition—The Morning Dawns. The Shadows Flew—True Knowledge of God Will Soon Fill the Earth and Carry Blessings to All.

Madison, Wis., July 6.—The INTERNATIONAL BIBLE STUDENTS ASSOCIATION have been holding a convention here for eight days, closing today. It has a large attendance of Bible Students from all parts. Pastor Russell spoke today.

He took for his text the words, "The Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort"—2 Corinthians 1:3. The Pastor stated that when in India, China and Japan last year he was impressed with the intelligence of many amongst those peoples. He visited their temples to ascertain the status of the worshippers. Many seemed sincere, absolutely unmindful of anything except their own worship. He made inquiry as to whether the idol was regarded as the god, or merely as a reminder of their god. He was assured that the idol was known to be metal, stone, etc., and was used in much the same way that Catholics use the crucifix—not as worshiping the image, but merely to assist in fixing reverence and the spirit of worship.

Our Creed Idols Worse. Pastor Russell said that at first he felt disposed to chide the heathen for the hideous features which they give their idols. But a little reflection brought him shame and confusion. He perceived that the creeds of Christendom are idols, set before our mental eyes, with exactly the same hideous features as the tangible idol before the natural eyes of the heathen. Each creed shows a slightly different image

mic biology, or biology as a phenomenon of the universal forces."

"Civic biology," the kind he advocates for high school, Prof. Hodge defines as "those biological facts which everyone wishes his neighbor knew." Out-doors is his only laboratory, and the common pests and vermin of the locality are his apparatus.

He sets high school students studying the plant and animal life about the community, each one specializing on some plant, tree, bird, or insect and reporting to the rest of the class throughout the whole year. Each one grows his own plant or animal so far as possible besides observing those that grow wild. Complete laboratory notes are kept, and the effect is constant to make a definite contribution to the solution of some problem that is vexing the community.

### Double Death in Chicago.

Chicago, July 7.—With a bullet hole through his heart, the body of a man registered as J. Henry Smith of San Francisco, was found in a room at the Great Northern hotel today. He left a note addressed to Mrs. John L. Sale of San Francisco, reading: "To avoid Cathleen I chose death."

With her face badly battered and bruised the body of a fashionably dressed woman was found at the Victoria hotel. Death was due to asphyxiation. The woman last night registered with a man as John Smith and wife. The man left the hotel last night. Police think the girl was beating unconscious, a tube was tied about her lips.

San Francisco, July 7.—J. Henry Smith who ended his life in Chicago was an employe of an insurance company here, and started ten days ago to visit relatives in New Jersey.

of God, but all picture Him as a most atrocious character, more hideous by far than are the idols of heathendom.

How could anybody make an idol that would speak such horrible things as all of our creeds portray by description? What artist could picture a God deliberating upon the creation of the human family with procreative powers, and before beginning His work planning and arranging a great place called Hell (and some say another called Purgatory), creating fire-proof devils to man these, laying up fuel to last throughout eternity, and then starting humanity, with the foreknowledge that thousands of millions would spend eternity in those horror chambers?

No heathen was ever capable of such imagination, and hence none ever pictured such a God, either in clay, metal, stone or with pen. It remained for the most cultured and civilized peoples, who had most enjoyed God's favors, to misrepresent Him most, and then to carry those misrepresentations to the heathen.

The Heathen Know It, Too. Missionaries have indeed reached few, said the Pastor, but their numbers is small; so also their intelligence. The more intelligent are agnostic. Christianity has led them to doubt their own religions, but has given them nothing instead.

When some high caste natives learned that the Pastor's preaching differed from that of the missionaries, they sent a committee asking him to remain longer and assuring him of audiences of the higher caste natives. They explained that they could not receive the white man's religion because it pictured a God so terrible and so unjust as to be repugnant to their minds. Their own religion taught them to be kind, even to dumb brutes.

The Pastor felt obliged to apologize for all Christendom. He explained that certain parables and symbolic passages have been misunderstood; and while we had the best intentions, Satan has kept Christendom in darkness, and led us to picture in our creeds a God who was unjust, unloving, and using His Power contrary to every principle of righteousness.

He told them, further, that the dawn of the New Age is upon us, the thousand years of Christ's Reign. God's faithful people are gradually coming to a better understanding of the Bible. He urged them to cling to the Bible, and assured them that he was endeavoring to arrange so that they may get a better understanding of what the Bible really teaches.

### Good Tidings to Every Nation.

Pastor Russell's visit to foreign lands was strictly in the interests of the true Gospel—"Good Tidings of great joy." The Association has had sermons translated into Japanese, Korean, Chinese, and the six principal languages of India, and millions of copies are in the hands of the people. Considerable fresh interest has been aroused. People in those lands have begun to study their Bibles.
