The price has not fallen below 10 cents and it is doubtful if they will stay at that figure much longer. The end came rather suddenly and many housewives have not "put up" their customary amount of strawberry preserves and "sauces" this year on account of this. The variety coming in now are entirely homegrown and are not very choice either.

James Ellis, one of the pioneer farmers of the Camas Prairie country, met with an accident near Nye yesterday afternoon, while hauling a load of hay, which resulted in his death. It is not known just what happened, as he was packed up along side of the road under part of a load of hay in an unconscious condition, with his head badly cut up, one theory being that he fell between the load and team striking his head on the wagon tongue. He was taken to Pilot Rock and Dr. [unclear] called, who did all he could for the patient, but he passed away without being able to tell any of the particulars of the accident.

The deceased leaves a wife and three children to mourn his death. He was about 61 years of age and had been farming in the southern part of the country for a number of years. The funeral will be held at Pilot Rock.—Pendleton Live Wire.
