MANY CLASSY SHORT RACES ON JULY 27

WINNING RACES AND BICYCLE CONTESTS ON.

Barrel Race to Bring Forth Expert Stick Jumpers That Day.

Some excellent running races and contests for bicycles are being arranged

for July 27 when the big La Grande-Packer and return motorcycle races will be staged in La Grande. Various events of an athletic nature are under consideration but have not been finally made ready. Among those that will be held however are foot-races for boys under 16 for the quarter mile event and a free for all boys'

100 yard dash. The last race is also for boys under 16.

Hurdle Race Sure

An event that promises to be of a great deal of interest is a high hurdle race with Jay Millering, the crack pole vaulter and hurdler, and Willie Pearce, high school hurdler and half miler, entered and the probabilities of still more coming in. Millering has been running the hurdles at O. A. C. and was a point winner in that event under local high school colors and Pearce has hopped the sticks with perfected form in high school meets for several years. The race should be exceptionally thrilling.

Boys are to have their inning. In addition to the running races bicycle races for boys under 16, are prepared for. These races will be over the half mile course and two and a half mile course as well. Events for mature amateurs, both foot and bicycle, will also be staged if the entrants can be found. Anyone desiring to enter such an event, 100 and a longer sprint if need be, should notify Secretary Secor of the Union County Fair association or A. W. Nelson.

These are but a few of the attractions that will be carried on during the time the motorcycles are on their way to Baker and return.

"We are going to give an afternoon of good sport—a full afternoon of it," said Secretary Secor this morning.

"We have some horse events in the course of preparation but are still not certain and announcement will be made later of these events."

Entries for the endurance race must be in by Tuesday previous to the 27th and entries to running races in by Friday before the 27th.
