La Grande Write From Michigan of Enjoyable Journey.

Detroit, Mich., July 14.—(To the Editor of the Observer)—I thought perhaps our friends would like to hear from us through the Observer so will write you a few lines.

We left June 28 and arrived at Salt Lake Sunday about noon, too late for the Organ recital arranged for our party, but were well entertained by the Commercial club with rides around the city and to Salt Air out on the south end of Salt Lake.

Monday we passed over the greatest scenic railway route in the world which baffles description. At noon we went over the Tennessee Pass, 10,240 feet above sea level and is right near Leadville, the smoke stacks of which we could see. There is a little post office at the pass where we mailed post cards. Just before night we took the wildest ride I ever took. It was between Pueblo and Denver, right along the side of a roaring stream through a deep gorge where the rocks stood up on either side hundreds of feet and the railroad grade was very steep and the track very crooked and rough. The train rushed down, down this road, I suppose from 60 to 70 miles an hour and it makes your hair stand up when the cars jump and rock and pinch and seem liable to go over into the rushing waters below. We arrived at Denver at 9 p. m. and lay there until the next night. The Commercial club entertained us handsomely with sight-seeing around their beautiful city. We arrived at Omaha the next morning.

At Omaha they entertained us even better than Denver or Salt Lake with sight seeing and picture shows, etc. We arrived in Chicago July 3, 8 a. m. and only stayed two hours and would have arrived in Detroit at 6 p. m. but for a freight wreck east of Jackson at which place we were delayed three hours. Then they sent us over the L. T. & M. S. to Detroit, where we arrived about 11 p. m. and found our folks who had been waiting five hours for us.

Mrs. Day went to Pontiac Friday morning. Detroit is growing at a rapid rate and is the greatest automobile manufacturing city in the world.

We are well and having a good visit and expect to leave here Saturday for Ottumwa, Pontiac, Bay City, Mackinac City, Petoskey, Mackinac Island and many other places and expect to be back here to attend the state fair in September.
