MOTORCYCLIST HURT.

Work Train Strikes Machine and Driver Knocking Both Long Way.

Baker, July 15.—The Herald said last night that while crossing the O.-W. R. & N. railroad tracks at Line yesterday morning, J. A. Stout was hurled 40 feet through the air, breaking a rib, smashing a kidney and otherwise sustaining internal injuries which have been determined. The motorcycle which he was riding, was picked up by the engine, but because of its weight was not thrown so far as was Stout. It was badly damaged.

It is said the crossing at Line is a particularly dangerous one, as it is impossible to see a train approaching from either direction. It is difficult to hear, especially if the train is coasting down the grade.

Engineer Ebell was in charge of the work train which was traveling 20 miles an hour. Stout, before his approach to the crossing, slowed down his machine listening for an approaching train, but thinking he was safe he attempted to cross the tracks. When the engine struck him in the left side he was a trifle over half way across the track. He was thrown up against a fence and when picked up by the train crew it was thought he could not live.

He was taken to Huntington by the trainmen, where he was left in charge of the railroad physician. This morning he was taken to Boise where he was placed in the hospital.

Stout was on his way to Boise for a visit with his sister, Mrs. Dr. Braxton, when the accident occurred. The victim is 19 years old and owns a ranch in Powder valley. His brother, C. B. Stout is interested in the Oregon Mill and Grain company's flouring mill in this city.

POWER CONCERNS UNHURT.

Judge Standrod Expresses His Opinion Senator Bradley Not Involved.

Boise, July 11.—Judge D. W. Standrod of Pocatello, member of the public utilities commission is convinced that no embarrassment will come to United States Senator Brady as a result of the collapse of the Kuhn banks in Pittsburgh and McKeesport, Pa.

When the news of the Kuhn failure was first circulated locally many expressed the fear that it would involve Senator Brady to some extent because of the recent sale of the American Falls power plant by Senator Brady to the Kuhn brothers. Judge Standrod, who was intimately associated with Senator Brady in the making of this power deal, is satisfied that everything is all right on this point.

"The very worst that could happen," Judge Standrod said in reply to a question, "would be to have the property thrown back upon Senator Brady's hands, and I do not look for anything of this kind. The American Falls power plant is a going concern; it is doing a splendid business furnishing power to American Falls, Pocatello, Ross Fork, Blackfoot and other places in that section; and, as I understand it, it is paying not only the interest on the bonds, but dividends on the stock."

"If it should fail to pay the interest on the bonds, and if for any reason Senator Brady should conclude that his interests were jeopardized, he would be to go into the courts and even if that step were taken, the receiver might run the business right along indefinitely until the Kuhns got their business matters straightened out."
