CIRCUIT COURT COMES TO END

RECESS FOR SEVERAL WEEKS IS ORDERED.

Several Cases Disposed of During the
Last Day of Court.

This morning circuit court for the
June term was wound up and the ju-
rors released for the balance of the
term. The last case on the docket
was the case in which Glenn Vickers
of Kamela, was indicted jointly with
one D. J. Austin for forgery.

D. J. Austin, who turned state's evi-
dence, tried to implicate Glenn Vickers,
and testified that Vickers also
stole some of the sheep.

The proof showed that one of the
chief witnesses against Vickers, Aus-
tin, was so drunk at the time of the al-
leged crime, that he could hardly stand
up, and he, himself admitted on the
stand that his memory of many of the
events of the night of the alleged bur-
glary were vague and indistinct. The
jury made short work of this case, and
found Glen Vickers not guilty after a
few minutes of deliberation.

Attorney R. J. Green represented
Vickers. A large number of citizens
of La Grande and Kamela testified at
the trial.

Benge, who was convicted of assault
and sentenced today by Judge Knowles
to 60 days in the county jail. Judge
Knowles made the sentence light in
compliance with the request of the
jury for mercy in his behalf.

TRIPLE ARMY AGAINST SOFIA

GREEKS, SERVIANS AND ROU- MANIANS COMBINE.

Not Believed Powers Will Permit Coal- ition of Forces.

London, July 17.—Alignment of
forces of Greece, Serbia and Roumania
to crush Bulgaria is announced in dis-
patches. At a conference in Saloni-
ka it was planned to consolidate the
armies and march to Sofia to force
Bulgarians to seek peace. Diplomats
are concerned but don't believe the
powers will permit combined forces
to reach the Bulgarian capital. Bel-
grade dispatches report another Bul-
garian setback. It is stated Serbian
troops yesterday stormed Julikamik
routing the right wing of the Bulgar-
ian army and casualties were enorm-
ous.
Sofia telegraphs that Turkish troops

are advancing in three columns. One
division is reported twenty miles be-
yond Mediaenos, the line of the Turk-
ish boundary fixed in London treaty.
If the Ottoman soldiers continue to ad-
vance it is believed powers will pro-
test. Roumanian troops continue to
advance without opposition from Bul-
garia. The king of Roumania is in
personal command of the troops. It is
reported the Bulgarians sank two tor-
pedo boats and two steamers in the
Danube to prevent their capture by
Roumania.

Sofia, July 17.—Unable to form a
cabinet, M. Malinoff, the new premier,
has declared situation in Bulgaria as
far as war is concerned, is hopeless un-
less the powers intervene. King Fer-
dinand, of Bulgaria replied by telegraph
to the king of Roumania that he was
ready to negotiate for peace, but terms
were not mentioned.

WILSON MAY BE RECALLED

NOT BELIEVED AMBASSADOR WILL GO BACK.

Germany Again Reported to Have De- manded American Protection.

Washington, July 17.—While it is
generally believed that no decisive ac-
tion by the government will be taken
in regard to the Mexican situation un-
til the arrival in Washington of Am-
bassador Wilson, both foreign and
American interests are clamoring for
recognition by the United States of
the Heurta government. Ambassador
Wilson it is believed, will not return
to Mexico.

Bankers Willing to Make Loan.

American bankers it is said, are
willing to make loans to Mexico if the
Huerta government is recognized by
the United States. At the same time
financial interests of other nations
hesitate to loan money until action is
taken by the American government.

It is authoritatively stated at the
White House that the president does
not intend to change his attitude to-
ward Mexico, as he doesn't regard the
situation as more acute than frequent-
ly since March.

Trouble With Mexicans.

Eagle Pass, Tex., July 17.—Details
of an alleged plot to dynamite the
American consulate at Pargas Nierras
Mexico, were telegraphed to Wash-
ington by Consul Ellsworth, today.
After sending official records of the
consulate to Eagle Pass, Ellsworth
spent the night at the army post here.
He refused to discuss the alleged plot
Wilson to Washington.

Ambassador Wilson is in Vera Cruz
today and expects to reach Washington
the 28th. He left Mexico City last
night. It is announced that his trip
to Washington is for the purpose of
placing the situation before the ad-
ministration exactly as it is in Mexi-
co.

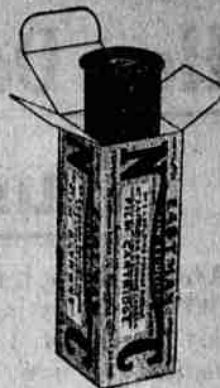
