TRACK EVENTS
TAKING SHAPE

SEVERAL HARNESS AND RUNNING RACES ON

Next Sunday to Be Crammed Full of Exciting and Varied Events.

A half dozen races for harness and running horses has been sandwiched in between other attractions next Sunday afternoon at the fair grounds when the big motorcycle endurance races occur. In addition to the attractions listed yesterday, there will be a 2:30, (three heats), a 2:30 trot, and a free for all. It is probable that Delmas will be entered in the free for all and this insures fast time in that race. For the ponies, there will be a half mile, a three-eighths and a quarter mile dash. Then there is to be a balloon ascension too.

Workmen are cleaning off the track so that it will be in first class condition for the track events. The program will be so full that every minute will have to be utilized, and arrangements to crowd one event after the other on the track are going on.

During the next day or two flags and signboards will be posted along the course between here and Baker for warning to teams that are passing through defiles and canyons. Wherever the view of the road is obscured, a sign will be hung up warning traffic to keep close watch for the motorcycle racers and practically an open road will be accorded the racers. The entries continue to come in, and the money is piling up to assume big proportions. Tonight is the last day for entries and a fine bunch of starters is assured.

Strike Settlement Progresses.

New York, July 22.—An early settlement of the difficulties of the eastern railroad employes is predicted by the members of the federal board of mediation. The conference of representative trainmen and the board is scheduled for this afternoon when the basis of the arbitration will be reached.

Erie Railroad's Move Considered.

The federal committee of mediation today are seriously considering the stand taken by the officials of the Erie railroad, who refused to open their case for arbitration by this board and will try to persuade that road to re-enter the conference. Failing in this, the Erie officials will be asked to submit their grievances to a separate arbitration board.

New Use For Battleships.

Rome, July 22.—By an order formally announced today by the minister of marine, Italy solves the problem of what to do with discarded battleships, and also possibly, what to do with the entire navy, should world-wide disarmament ever come. As fast as the warships become too antiquated for modern naval use, they will hereafter be given to the National Society for the Care of Tubercular children of Italy and its colonies.

The society plans to refit the war vessels into hospitals and give them permanent anchorage not only about the coast of Italy, but off the coast in whatever part of the world Italian colonies are to be found. Others will be used as cruising hospitals for those of the invalids who need such treatment.

The action today of the Italian government in giving its consent is the result of a propaganda to that end begun at the Internal Congress of Hygiene held at Rome last year.

More Suffragettes Caught.

London, July 22.—Six women were arrested with Mrs. Pankhurst here and convicted of disturbing the peace. An imprisonment of three weeks was imposed in each case.

GRACE COMES
VIA NEW LAW

WEEDS ORDINANCE REACHES UNTIL JULY 25.

Street Superintendent Finds That Arrests Can't Come Just Now.

Several days of grace were given to the delinquent property owners in the weed campaign this week through the discovery by Chas. Stacey, street superintendent, that the new ordinance covering the weed situation gives property owners until July 25 to destroy noxious weeds. The ordinance—recently adopted—became effective July 19 and the arrests which were pending yesterday in cases where the property owners had not cleaned lots of all weeds, had to be held off until the 26th. By that time it is possible that some will have removed weeds which at present would cause arrests on the 26th.

Baker After Weeds.

Baker is also in line for the extermination of noxious weeds. A story from the Baker Herald states that attention is being called to the growth of weeds in vacant lots within the city limits, the weeds being of the varieties stated in the law dealing with such cases. It is probable that within the next few days Baker will have taken the same steps that La Grande has in this direction. If all the cities in eastern Oregon would take these same steps it would not take long for us to rid the country of this pest.

PEACE TERMS POPULAR.

Several Nations Now Adopt Offer to Mediate Balkan War.

Vienna, July 22.—Dispatches from Bucharest say that Roumania is willing to accept the peace terms proposed by the Bulgars.

Greece and Serbia have agreed upon peace negotiations and it is believed that the end of the struggle approaches.

London, July 22.—Whether Adrianople is in the hands of the Bulgars or Turks can't be definitely learned. The Sofia dispatches deny the Turks recaptured it although they admit it was menaced.

Constantinople, July 22.—Dispatches from Constantinople state that the Turks do possess Adrianople. The Porte officially announced tonight that the Turkish army entered and recaptured the Holy City of Adrianople in the name of the Turkish empire.

H. C. REES SELLS.

Mrs. Ralston Buys Home—Sells Lot to Chas. Norby.

H. C. Rees has disposed of his Adams avenue property, formerly the J. E. Reynolds home, to Mrs. Hattie J. Ralston and Mrs. Ralston has sold off 50 feet on the west side to Charles Norby, who expects to build one or two modern cottages this fall. Mr. and Mrs. Rees will move into their property on N avenue about August first at which time Mrs. Ralston will take possession of her new purchase. The deal was perfected through the Geo. H. Currey Real Estate agency.

DETROIT STAR DISSATISFIED

Navin Refutes Report That Cobb Will Leave Tigers.

Detroit, July 22.—Denial of the published reports that Ty Cobb was exchanged for Tris Speaker of Boston, and a cash consideration, was made today by Owner Navin, of the Detroit Tigers. No club in any league he said could give in either cash or players, what Cobb is worth to Detroit.

Cobb Is Dissatisfied.

Despite his \$12,500 salary, Ty Cobb is dissatisfied. He would "welcome a change," which would make him a member of some team other than Detroit.

Discussing the report that he was to be traded for Speaker of the Boston Red Sox, Cobb said he would like very much to play in Boston but did not think Boston would part with Speaker. "There are two other American league cities in which I would like to play," he added.

MOTHER OF 4
IS IN ASYLUM

MRS. GJETTRUP'S MIND SNAPS UNDER HEAVY LOAD.

Four Children Left Homeless and Destitute by Mother's Illness.

Harrassed by family troubles having their climax in desertion by the husband and father, it is said, augmented by financial difficulties, Mrs. Caroline Gjettrup, of Mt. Glenn, has lost her mind and will be housed in the state sanatorium at Pendleton. With the departure of the mother for the Pendleton institution, four children are left homeless and destitute, but Mt. Glenn neighbors have given at least temporary shelter for them. The oldest of the four is about 12 years and the youngest five or six.

It is believed that rest and quiet afforded at the hospital will eventually restore Mrs. Gjettrup's shattered mind.


