Indications Point to a Bounteous Harvest for All Types.

Imbler, Ore., July 23.—(Special)—The second cutting of alfalfa in some of the large orchards will be ready to cut the last of this week. The first crop damaged by the rain, is now all out of the way. Some sold at \$5.00 per ton in the field and the worst was burned.

The Imbler brass band gave its first public concert on the square last Saturday night, to a delighted audience.

Imbler seems to be on the picture show circuit now, another one is billed for Wednesday evening.

The foundation of the new bank building is going in.

Apple thinning is in full progress. The best cherry crop Imbler has ever raised is being harvested. The potato outlook, both for crop and prices never looked more favorable and the

Because of so many new orchards coming into bearing, Imbler will pick more apples this year than last, while the rest of the valley will produce about 50 per cent or less, of the crop harvested last season.

TWENTY MEN ON ONE FLOOR

RE-ORGANIZATION OF O. W. OFFICE FORCE PROGRESSES.

Railroad News and Items of Interest

Machinist Imprisoned.

In the re-organization of the local division, joint offices of the O. W. heads of departments have about reached the desired perfection in arrangement. The new order of things places 20 men in the depot office in addition to those housed in the Foley building. Probably no group of offices on one floor of any building in the city commands the salaries that this depot second floor has. Of the 20 men employed, a large majority of the number draw over \$150 monthly and very few less than \$200. The store now accommodates the dispatchers, assistant Superintendent Corbett and Buckley, two conductors, the bridge superintendent and signal maintenance. Checks to such officials of this line as require checks, are also housed in that group of offices.

Number 3 last night was deluged on the T. & N. and a start out of Fossilville passed through the city this morning about 11 o'clock. No. 27 report out as first section and the sub. No. 3 as second 27.

Number 4 this morning was a heavily loaded train. Two extra pullmans were included to provide room for a

big group of Woodmen of the World of Portland going to Denver.

To be imprisoned for eight hours in the steam dome of the little engine No. 52, yesterday, was the experience of one O. W. machinist. He is a little Englishman, and not so much because of his nationality as his lack of body bulk, he was assigned to the task of crawling into the steam dome of the little engine to make some repairs. He got in alright but couldn't get out. It was 10 o'clock yesterday when he got caught, and it was 6:20 in the afternoon when the boiler had been sufficiently torn to pieces to let him out. He refused offers of water and food while imprisoned saying he was enjoying himself and drawing a salary at the same time. There was no bodily suffering whatever—only the inconvenience of laying cooped up in the steam dome for that length of time.

The county court has instructed Superintendent S. J. Campbell to employ a corps of competent inspectors to assist in the fighting of blight. Each owner whose orchard is infected will be instructed to clean up, and in his failure to do so the orchard will be cleared by the county at the expense of the owner.

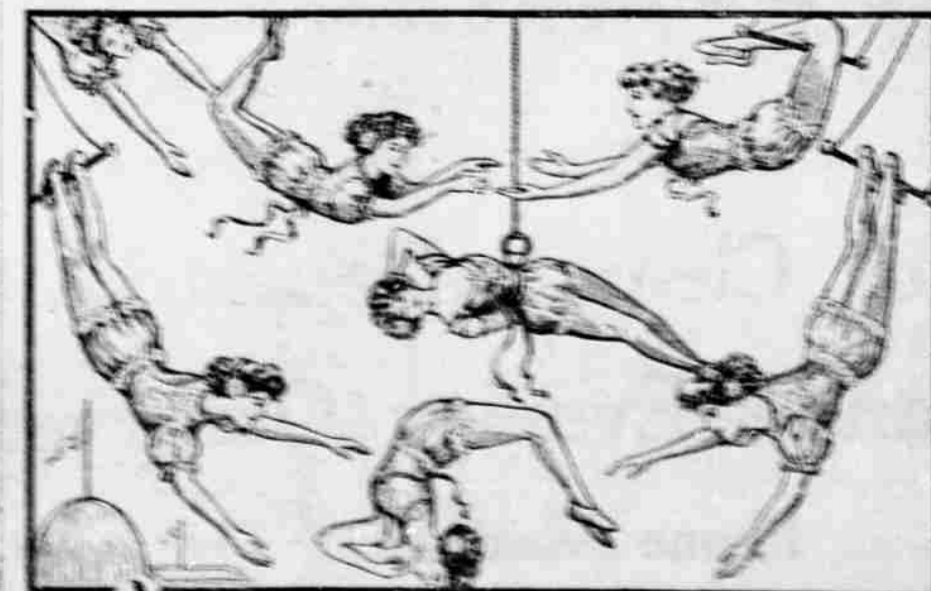
